Edison's storage batteries for submarine proved a success yesterday in a test at the New York navy yard, according to an announcement made by Miles Reese Hutchinson, a representative of the inventor. The batteries eliminate the deadly chlorine gas, so disastrous to submarine crews. Edison has been working on it five years.

## FORESTS GIVE AWAY TIMBER

According to statistics just compiled by the forest service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1915, approximately 128,952,000 feet of timber was cut on the forests of Washington, Oregon and Alaska.

Besides this, 14,493,000 feet was given, under free use permit, to settlers and others living in or near the national forests.

In Washington the amount of timber taken under free use was 2,371,000 feet, the settlers in the vicinity of the Okanogan forest taking nearly 30 per cent.
