

Bible Will Be Studied

Bible study, free from denominational bias, will be taught under auspices of the Tacoma public schools, the school board has decided.

The plan suggested by the Tacoma Ministerial alliance has long been under consideration by the board, and on the final adoption of the courses of the International Graded lessons were agreed on to insure absolute freedom from creed bias. Work is to be done in the homes.

The course will consist of 33 recitations of 30 minutes each, extending throughout the year.

A grade of 70 must be obtained before the pupil passes the course. The general titles of the two courses are known as the "History of the Apostolic Age," and "The Old Testament."

Only those pupils will be permitted to take an examination at the end of the semester who are recommended by the principals for good conduct, class work and attendance.
