The Parkland school fair to be held this evening in the Lutheran academy gymnasium promises to be a very successful one.


Although the farmers and mechanics of Parkland will have specimens of their handwork they will not be competing against the children for the prizes offered.

'Casey Jones,' World Champion Fan, Writes About World Series

Lycurgus McDowell, better known as 'Casey Jones,' because he is a railroad engineer, and the champion fan of baseball, has written five world series articles for The Times.

'Casey' won the title of champion fan in a country-wide canvass a few weeks ago, in which the judges were John K. Tenner, president of the National League, Charles Comiskey, president of the American League, and Hugh S. Fullerton, baseball critic.

Reams have been written about world series by experts and ball players, but this is the first time that the fan body—that part of baseball which makes the national game possible—has been represented in print.
