PICKS PHILS TO WIN; CHAMPION FAN TELLS ABOUT THE SERIES

This is the first of a series of world series stories written for The Times by Lycurgus McDowell, better known as "Casey Jones," because he is a railroad engineer, who has been chosen as the champion fan of the United States.

Railroad engineer voted world's champion fan.

It sometimes happens, as I well know, that an engineer will fail to bring his train in on a scheduled time. Pat Moran and Bill Carrigan, engineers of the Philadelphia Nationals and Boston Americans, may not whistle for the yard switch on the schedule I have figured for them, but I believe they will.

With the Phils and Red Sox in the world series, the big event fans sit back and wait for every season. I pick the Phils to win.

There are two reasons. One is that the Phils, playing on their

own cigar-box park, have a big edge on all opponents.

The right field fence and the left field bleachers in the Phil park are not as far from home plate as they are in regular managed parks. Balls that go over the fence and into the bleachers for homers would be caught on regular fields.

The Phil team is built to fit the park. Cravath, Luderus, Niehoff and most of the other Phils are big men who can hit the ball a mile. They are just the kind of swatters needed to drop long flies over the fence and into the bleachers for circuit trips.

Besides that, the Phil players have trained themselves to hit to right field. They have drilled themselves to aim for that short right field fence. Cravath and Niehoff, right hand batters, would naturally hit into left field and so would Bancroft, the little shortstop, but they have practiced until they can hit 'em a mile into right.

Luderus and Becker, left hand hitters, naturally hit into right field and they have laid some nice games on the shelf for the Phils this year with drives over the short fence.

Other teams play most of their games on big fields and have not trained for hitting to a certain spot so they are not as expert as

the Phils in plugging the home-run target.

If it should happen that the officials in charge of the series should agree that the Phil park is too small to hold the crowds and they should have the Philadelphia end of the series played in the big American league park in Philadelphia, I would pick Boston to win, despite Alexander.

The Red Sox have shown they can win ball games on big fields. The Phils, on the other hand, have not done nearly as well on the road as they have done at home, which means that if the Phils are put on a big field the long flies hit by their long hitters go into the hands of outfielders instead of over the fence or into the bleachers for home runs.

If it should happen that the Phils should meet Detroit or some other American league team in the series, the same dog goes. The Phils on their own grounds, can beat any team.

If the Phils fail to get into the series, then I pick Boston Sox to win. The Philly team is the only one in the National league, according to my dope, that can beat the Red Sox. And the Phils can beat any other team in the American league that happens to get into the series in case Boston fails to cop the pennant.

DRIVING DAYS ARE ENDED, SAYS NEWEST MANAGER

The baseball manager who wants to make a success of it these days will forget that John McGraw and Frank Chance won pennants by driving their players. Such is the philosophy of Leo Fohl, temporary manager of the Cleveland Indians, who most likely will start the 1916 campaign as their regular manager.

Fohl got in when Joe Birmingham was kicked out.

Fohl has won a lot of pennants but hadn't had much big league experience when given control of the Indians. He always was a shark and at bringing out young players, especially pitchers, so Somers had no hesitancy about promoting him from coach to manager.

"The way to run a ball club is to study your players' faces, figure out the best way to handle each man and then wield the whole bunch into a machine without 'riding' any of them," Fohl says.

"Ball players of today are more sensitive than those of ten years ago. You can't get anywhere by driving them. Hammer team work into them, let each one work out his own problems most of the time and correct their mistakes without handing around bawls out."

Like Clarence Rowland of the White Sox Fohl is a "basher." But where Rowland has been handed the biggest stars Comiskey could buy for him, Fohl has had to work with a very limited backing. Still he has improved his team.
