REDFIELD HAS PLAN TO PREVENT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 29.—America is prepared to prevent the unloading of low-priced European goods here after the close of the war, Secretary of Commerce Redfield told the United Press today. He announced that his plans to protect American industries were almost complete, and that a tariff wall would play but a minor part in them. "If," he said, "we see that foreign nations are unloading goods on us cheaper than they sell at home, as is the custom under the German cartel and other European systems, we shall have our consuls collect the facts. "Then the foreign manufacturers who are planning to undermine American industry will be denied shipping manifests by our consuls. It will be made criminal, too, for any American to buy such goods planned to undersell, 'unfairly, American goods.' " Special attempts will be made to protect new industries which have sprung up during the war, such as the dye industry.



ORDINANCE NO. 621.—An ordinance providing for the improvement of "O" Street between North 5th and North 7th Streets, in the City of Tacoma, by the construction of a concrete curb and gutter, and the necessary storm water drainage. WHEREAS, an initial resolution adopted by the Council of the City of Tacoma Sept. 1st, 1915, declaring the intention of said Council to make the improvement herein described and fixing Monday, Sept. 20th, 1915, as the time for hearing objections to the making of said improvement, was duly published as provided by law; and WHEREAS, prior to the 20th day of September, 1915, the Commissioner of Public Works of said City submitted to said Council the estimated cost of said improvement in the sum of \$269.00; and a statement of the proportionate amount thereof which should be borne by the several lots, tracts or parcels of land and other property which will be specially benefited by said improvement; and the amount of the improvement to be borne by each lot, tract or parcel of land within said district; and WHEREAS, on said 20th day of September, 1915, the said improvement was made or presented to the Council; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TACOMA: Section 1. That "O" Street between North 5th and North 7th Streets, be improved by laying concrete sidewalks six feet in width; according to the plans and specifications heretofore prepared therefor by the City Engineer, now on file in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works. Section 2. That the real property to be benefited by said improvement and which is hereby designated Local Improvement District No. 961, is described as follows: Lots 1 to 19 inclusive in Block 3229, Map of New Tacoma, W. T. All of said property being in the City of Tacoma, Pierce County, Washington. Section 3. An assessment is hereby levied upon the several lots, tracts and parcels of land in said Local Improvement District for the purpose of defraying the cost of said improvement, in accordance with the laws of the State of Washington and Ordinance No. 4611 of said City. Said assessment so levied upon said lots, tracts and parcels of land respectively, may be paid either in cash, without interest, before the issuance of bonds, or in five equal annual installments, together with interest on the whole sum so charged at six per cent per annum; and each year after the issuance of the bonds hereinafter provided for one of such installments, together with the interest due thereon and on all installments thereafter to become due, shall be collected in

Section 4. A special fund is hereby created to be called Local Improvement District No. 961, which shall consist in the aggregate of the several amounts assessed and levied upon the several lots and parcels of land in said local improvement district for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense of said improvement. Out of said fund shall be paid the bonds, interest thereon, and the entire cost of said improvement, and no part of said fund shall become the property of the City of Tacoma, but shall be treated as a special trust fund for the purpose herein indicated. Section 5. The Commissioner of Public Works is hereby ordered to proceed with said improvement by letting a contract for the construction of said improvement, and therefor in the manner provided by the City Charter, and make out and certify to the Council an assessment roll, charging the cost and expense of said improvement against said lots, tracts and parcels of land in the manner provided by law. In calling for bids the Commissioner of Public Works shall state the time after doing the work shall agree to accept at par the bonds issued in pursuance of this ordinance in payment of the same, and shall have no claim whatever on account thereof against the City of Tacoma, except solely upon said bonds, the special assessment made and the fund hereby created. Section 6. Under the provisions of Chapter 98 of the laws of the State of Washington of 1911, and this ordinance, there shall be issued and sold five-year annual installment local improvement bonds against said district amounting in the aggregate to a sum equal to the amount of said assessment remaining unpaid at the time of their issuance, but not in excess of the cost and expense of said improvement, which bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from the date of their issuance, shall be numbered consecutively and be in denominations of \$100, each, except the first numbered bond, which may be for a less amount if necessary. Said bonds shall be issued and sold after the expiration of the time when said assessment may be paid without interest, penalty or cost, as fixed by the City Treasurer's notice of the assessment roll being in his hands for collection. Section 7. An emergency exists and this ordinance shall take effect immediately after publication. Passed Sept. 29, 1915. Attest: W. D. NICKERL, Mayor. City Clerk.
