## KAISER LEADS BALKAN DRIVE

### BOSTON WORLD CHAMP

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 13.—A tugging match, in which the short Philadelphia fences and bleachers made possible four home runs, today resulted in another Red Sox victory, 5 to 4. The Bostonians thus became the champions of the world.

The victory came after a seven-inning contest, in which the Red Sox drove Mayer from the box and handled Rixey roughly, while the Phillies pounded out long drive after long drive off Foster, diminutive hero of the second combat.

Every run was due to extra-base hitting. The contest finally was won for Boston when in the ninth Hooper drove out his second home run of the game.

The little Philly park was crowded to a fair extent, the official figures being 20,306.

### BALKAN HISTORY MAKING

PARIS, Oct. 13.—Bulgaria declared war against Serbia Tuesday, according to a Bucharest dispatch today.

Including San Marino, this makes 14 nations now engaged in the war.

Russia is preparing to land a vast army on the Bulgarian coast, according to the Rumanian journal Universal.

**KAISER AT NEW FRONT**  
LONDON, Oct. 13.—The kaiser is already on the Serbian front supervising the invasion of his forces, it is rumored here today.

**GERMANS ADVANCING**  
VIENNA, Oct. 13.—Pushing their way into the east, the Austro-Germans are seeking a junction with the Bulgarians. They are attacking all along the Danube and Save rivers and on the Drina's east bank, it is officially stated.

The army has advanced only in the face of an admittedly heavy resistance.

The Austrians have captured Mt. Lipa, east of Belgrade. They are now advancing southward from Belgrade while the Germans are driving the Serbians before them from Belgrade in the direction of Passarowitz.

**NEW SERB CAPITAL**  
PARIS, Oct. 13.—After one transfer already, another shift of the Serbian capital is in prospect, this time to Monastir, in the southwest corner of the country.

Nish is expected to fall into Bulgarian hands before the Teutons reach it.

**Fawcett Wins His Dry Fight**  
Mayor Fawcett today won his fight for an ordinance which will make blind-pigging after Jan. 1 in Tacoma a serious offense.

The council unanimously approved an ordinance which will compel the acting chief of police to report to the prosecuting attorney the names of all persons convicted of offenses under the liquor or red-light laws, together with a list of witnesses in each case.

This will enable the prosecutor to keep an official tab on offenders, so that the added penalties for second and subsequent convictions may be imposed.

Despite the city ordinance which imposes merely fines, the "drys" plan an aggressive prosecution of blind-piggers under the state law, which requires jail sentences for repeated offenses.

**Delcasse Steps Out**  
PARIS, Oct. 13.—The resignation of Foreign Minister Delcasse was announced officially today by Premier Viviani.

Delcasse is ill. Viviani has been acting for him for several days.

Delcasse is the man who arranged the triple entente and whose hostility to Germany has been given as one of the contributing causes of the war.

### ARMY SEEMS TO BE IN LEADER OPPOSES IDEA

Editor Tacoma Times: I am opposed to the big navy and army program now being agitated with so much energy throughout the country; especially by the jingoists and manufacturers of war equipment and their subtle, rammed, organized and powerful influences.

I shall not support in the next congress the eight, six, or four battleship or dreadnaught proposition, nor the 500,000 or 250,000 army increase proposition, nor the \$500,000,000 (more than double the annual appropriations heretofore) appropriation proposition for the army and navy.

Whether congress will vote for such an immensely increased appropriation depends on the president's attitude. If he insists on the change, increase, congress will vote for it. If he does not insist, in my opinion congress will not vote for it.

of military defense," writes Rep. Hilliard of Denver.

Rep. Hayes of California opposes a large army, but proposes compulsory military training for all young men after the manner of the Swiss system.

Senator Wadsworth of New York calls for a large reserve army, rather than a large standing army.

Senator Poindexter of Washington favors doubling both army and navy. "I think we should have a reserve (army) force and a carefully developed plan for rudimentary military training of young men volunteering for that purpose, of whom I am sure there will be several millions," he said.

Rep. Siegel, 20th New York, says he wrote 14,000 letters to constituents, and of the hundreds of replies not one opposed a bigger army and navy.

"We also need a little training in this country along the line of 'America first,'" writes Rep. Emerson of Cleveland.

Rep. Jas. A. Frear, 10th Wisconsin, says that there is already high scandal in American army expenditures and that the nation should see to this first.

### Wilson For Ship Fight Once Again

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 13.—On the eve of his departure for the west, Secretary McAdoo assured the United Press that he hoped and believed President Wilson again would press his merchant marine bill—the nut of which is U. S. purchase and operation of ship—to passage.

He dined with President Wilson last night.

The hopelessness of private capital coming to the relief of American foreign trade, and the fact that the government alone is strong enough to give the necessary quick assistance, were named by McAdoo as two reasons why he believed the bill would succeed.

**TAKE NO STEP "UNWELCOME TO GREECE"**

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Answering recent German statements that the landing of troops at Saloniki by the allies was a duplication of the Teutonic invasion of Belgium, a British official assured the United Press today that the allies had taken no step in Greek territory "unwelcome to Greece."

### Women Win Illinois Case

SPRINGFIELD, Oct. 13.—The state supreme court today denied the motion of Chicago liquor attorneys to file briefs in certain contested election cases, involving the right of woman suffrage.

The "wets" were attempting to open the way for a suit to invalidate woman suffrage in this state.

### Denver Golf Links Real Boon to Players There

DENVER, Oct. 13.—Denver has a tract of about 100 acres on the outskirts of City park, set aside by the city as a permanent golf course. It was donated a year and a half ago, and in the first year nine holes were completed. During the last week, the last nine holes of the 18-hole course were completed.

### RUSSIA RENEWS ATTACK

PETROGRAD, Oct. 13.—With fresh supplies of munitions, the Slavs again have taken the offensive and have made important gains in Galicia.

Having crossed the Strya river, they are driving the enemy before them in great disorder. They have captured immense supplies of cannon and ammunition and imprisoned several thousand soldiers.

Desperate fighting continues in the Dvinsk region.

The occupation of part of the Russian trenches near Illuxt by the Germans is admitted in the latest war office statement.

**NEW DRIVE IN WEST**  
AMSTERDAM, Oct. 13.—A new drive by the allies in the Artois and Champagne regions is momentarily expected.

It is understood here that the allies plan to keep the kaiser too busy on the western line to push far into the Balkans.

Meanwhile the Serbians are being reinforced.
