BIG COPPER CARGO

The vessels are under charter to W. R. Grace & Co. The first of the fleet scheduled to arrive is the Norwegian steamer Cuzco, due tomorrow morning. She will be followed by the Nann Smith, St. Helens and the Alvarado.

The attorney was secretly married nine years ago and he and his wife lived in different houses. The police are trying to find some clue to the murder.

CRUSHED BY ROCK
