SI GOTCHY IN MATCH WITH BILLY WEEKS

Billy Weeks and Si Gotchy will be the headliners on the Eagles' smoker card to be staged Thursday night, November 11. When George Shanklin, chairman of the Eagles' entertainment committee, made the announcement today, a thrill of pleasurable anticipation went through the sport fans of Tacoma. For Billy Weeks is one of the cleanest middleweight boxers in the Northwest, and Gotchy is a clever opponent. Weeks is a Vancouver, B. C., fireman. He recently resigned his position, however, and is coming to Tacoma to make his home. He should arrive in a day or so. Gotchy is an Aberdeen boy. Billy made a hit with Tacoma fight fans last season and the previous year, by his clean, meritorious work. He is a clever boxer, and mixes well when put up against a fast man. Gotchy is of the aggressive, boring type, and will force Weeks to show every bit of cleverness that he possesses. Tacoma will see a continuous season of boxing this year, if the plans of friends of the game materialize. Last week's decision by representatives of the social service board, who attended Paul Steele's smoker, that there was no reason to hinder clean boxing in Tacoma, has done more to encourage the game than any single occurrence in years. Paul Steele is arranging another smoker for Thanksgiving night and says that he will have a far better card than ever before.

"Duffy" Lewis Wears The Same Size Hat, Too

(Staff Special) SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2.—"Just had the breaks, that was all. I happened to come up in the pincush when they needed hits to win, and I was lucky enough to crack the ball. Out-guessed their pitchers, that was the way it happened." It was George ("Duffy") Lewis talking, star of the late world's series, just returned from Boston—the same Duffy person that left these parts last spring, bound for the Red Sox training camp. He's still wearing the same size hat and his chest measurements remain as they were before. There's no pompous attempt to analyze pitchers or to criticize this play and that. Just a straightforward assertion that he was working above his speed and luck was with him. "Gee, but it's good to be back home again," declared the Boston star. "No baseball for me this winter. I just want to take a good rest." The most valued possession the hero had when he arrived was a check for his share of the world's series money—\$3,825.35. And Duffy gave the check to his wife. Duffy didn't tarry in San Francisco. With Mrs. Duffy he and a handful of friends hopped on the train for Sonoma, Cal., Lewis' home, called by Jack London "The Valley of the Moon." A reception was being held there for "Duffy Duffy," as they call him. To Duffy that reception meant more than the cheer of the mighty crowd that greeted him when he sapped that homer in the sixth inning of the final game, tying the score. He sat almost dumbfounded through it all, an appreciative smile playing tag with his features. And time and again Mrs. Duffy wanted to throw her arms around him, but—well, she didn't, yet she wasn't fooling anybody, to use an expression of the game. Her best delivery was hit to all corners of the lot.

Miller Has Been Washington Star Back For Three Seasons

You are looking at the brightest individual backfield star in the Northwest conference today. Cedric Miller, of Vancouver, Wash., is the man. He is a senior law student in the state university and has played left half on the U. of W. team for three seasons.

"Hap" Miller was the individual star of Saturday's game with Whitman. He made two of the four touchdowns, shot some splendid forward passes down the field, and was generally in the front rank when there was any spectacular playing to be done. Miller usually is the Washington man selected when on the fourth down four or five yards are needed to complete the ten, and especially when the goal line is near. Hap is a big fellow, weighing 187 stripped, and is the nearest approach to speed in the backfield. On off tackle drives he can't be excelled anywhere, east or west. When he catapults his body through an opening, the other fellows merely lie down in front of him, and it takes about three to bring him down.


