

# EMPEROR CROWNED

GIOTO, Japan, Nov. 10.—Emperor Yoshihito's coronation here today was the first coronation in 25 centuries that representatives of the people have been permitted to attend. The Japanese people are greatly pleased.

Today's rather simple and brief ceremony, marking the accession of Yoshihito to the place handed down "by divine right" from his forefathers who were emperors "before the dawn of history," is the climax of the six weeks' accession program for which the diet appropriated \$2,000,000.

# DO YOU FOLLOW HIM?

BERLIN, Nov. 10.—The European war will end tomorrow, says a postcard from a German soldier in the Vosges. Germany's last great war was in 1870-1871. Peace was concluded May 10, 1871. Add 1870 to 1871 and you get 3741. Add the first two figures, 3 and 7, and you get 10. Add the last two and you get 5, meaning—10-5-71.

"This war has been in 1914-1915. Add 1914 to 1915 and you get 3829. Add the first two figures and you get 11. Add the last two and you get 11, meaning that peace will come on 11-11-15."

# CALCHAS LIBELED

Federal authorities yesterday libeled the Blue Funnel liner Calchas for \$26,000 to pay her fine imposed in Seattle by customs authorities for the recent seizure of \$75,000 worth of opium.

Agents of the owners claim the vessel was thoroughly searched for drugs before it entered American waters, but the cache was overlooked. The agents filed a \$30,000 bond, allowing the steamer to clear for Europe, pending the decision of officials at Washington.

# HOLD PRIMARIES

Cities of less than the first class in the state held their primary elections yesterday. In practically every instance registration was light, with many uncontested offices.

Kent, Olympia, Auburn, Bellingham and Port Angeles all reported quiet primaries. In many cases only single nominations were made, and in many cases by caucus. The general elections will be held early in the new year.


# CHANCE FOR SALMON

# MOTTMAN GETS LINE

Federal Judge Neterer reversed a referee's decision yesterday in the U. S. court in Seattle, returning to George Mottman of Olympia possession of a hotly contested logging right-of-way. The logging firm which bought the right-of-way from Mottman went bankrupt, and the trustees did not live up to the agreement with the original company, and the suit which terminated yesterday was started.

# Horrible Examples Parade Wall Street to Further Fight For Birth Control



NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—"I must drink alcohol to sustain life. Shall I transfer the craving to others?"

"I cannot read this sign. By what right have I children?"

and similar signs were carried up and down Fifth avenue and Wall street in a novel publicity campaign in favor of birth control and eugenics, just launched by the Medical Review of Reviews, under direction of Frederick H. Robinson.

Robinson is one of the original backers of Margaret Sanger in her fight to legalize birth control. William Sanger, her husband, has served a term in jail for giving some of Margaret Sanger's pamphlets to a Constable detective, who represented himself as a friend of the movement.

The procession in the heart of the metropolis is the first step in a nation-wide campaign which will seek to have the laws that prohibit discussion of birth control methods repealed.

Elimination of unfair marriages is another subject of the agitation.
