### CITY CHEATS OPIUM FIENDS OF \$25,000 WORTH OF DREAMS.



A \$25,000 SMOKE OF OPIUM, recently held in San Francisco's civic center when confiscated contraband narcotics were destroyed by order of the state pharmacy board. The pipes shown in the picture are mostly silver laid ebony and other costly material, valued by opium victims at from \$50 to \$300 each.

This public destruction of contraband is but one phase of the government's efforts to stamp out the opium traffic in the United States.

### IT'S RATHER UNUSUAL-- SUFFRAGISTS BUSY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 16.—In hundreds of congressional districts in the United States today, the women are in convention framing their local fights to pledge democratic and republican national convention delegates to favor national suffrage planks in the party platforms.

These local conventions are under the general national direction of Mrs. Medill McCormick of Chicago, an official of the National American Woman Suffrage association. The suffragists in each district will pledge their support to pro-suffrage delegates. Much time will be spent interviewing candidates. In states where national party delegates are chosen by state convention, the suffragists will concentrate upon pro-suffrage county delegates.

### SAY HE'S KIDNAPER

SEATTLE, Nov. 16.—Charged with kidnaping William Christie, amalgamator of the Treadwell Mining Co., Edward Krause of Petersburg, Alaska, was arrested here yesterday as he stepped off the steamer Jefferson.

Christie disappeared Nov. 1, after a man giving his name as Miller and representing himself to be a U. S. deputy marshal of Juneau served a subpoena on him to appear in court. Three days later Mrs. Christie, a bride of less than two months, made a statement in which she said Krause was an ardent admirer of her and was angry when she married Christie. Search for Christie has been carried on in southeastern Alaska.

### PROBE IS SERIOUS

Returning to Tacoma after an investigation of the arrest of Earl and Frank Ross, held in the Pacific county jail in connection with the North River trouble, Humane Officer Mueckler admitted today the situation is "disgraceful" and "serious," but refused to discuss the probe.

He is awaiting the return of Mrs. T. J. Hamilton and Mrs. Abbie Danforth, who are investigating the case for the Tacoma women's clubs, before making a report. They expected to visit the North River country before their return.

### MRS. EGGERS SANE

Mrs. Mathilde Eggers, wife of Theodore Eggers, Tacoma fish dealer, was declared sane yesterday behind closed doors by a commission composed of Drs. Charles McCreary and J. R. Brown.

It was decided, following several witnesses' testimony, that Mrs. Eggers had at times acted peculiarly, but that her actions were the result of money troubles rather than insanity.

### ST. LEO'S FAIR ON

St. Leo's fair opened last evening in a blaze of color and music. The fair began with a selection by the St. Leo's boys' band and a talk by J. F. Murphy of the fair association.

Judge J. W. Linek and Rev. George Weibel gave talks. Several exhibits of fancywork and art goods were on display, to say nothing of the dozens of booths, where everything from candy to a look into the future can be bought.

### ALLIES ARE WORRIED

LONDON, Nov. 16.—The allies are worried today over a threat of the Greek government to disarm any intente allies' troops seeking refuge in Greek territory.

Earl Kitchener's proposed visit to the Balkans became of increasing importance as a result.

### Yesterday's Late News

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 15.—Because it takes three federal judges to hear arguments and make decisions in cases involving the constitutionality of law, Judge Wolverson of the federal court this afternoon announced that he couldn't grant a temporary injunction against the operation of the Sunday closing law. He didn't know when the three judges would be present.

WON'T NAME HIGHER UPS NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Robert Fay, leader of the alleged anti-air bomb conspiracy, failed this afternoon in his discussions with federal officials to divulge the names of the "higher-ups." He offered to plead guilty to a charge of conspiracy.

BLESSINGS OF PEACE SALEM, Ore., Nov. 15.—Declaring that for Oregon and the United States, the year 1915 "has

been full of blessings and peace, in welcome contrast to the great war which has ravaged so many of the less fortunate countries of the world," the governor this afternoon designated Nov. 25 Thanksgiving day.

STROMBOLI ACTIVE ROME, Nov. 15.—Stromboli island vineyards were destroyed by an eruption of Stromboli volcano today and the neighboring island of Lipari is in a panic.

WALTER OBARK SUICIDES. BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Nov. 15.—Walter Clark, internationally famous as a breeder of well known race horses, committed suicide here this afternoon.

NO CONSCRIPTION—YET. LONDON, Nov. 15.—No attempt will be made to apply conscription without parliament's consent, Premier Asquith told the House of Lords today. He suggested that such a move might cause a misunderstanding.


