## CAR SMASHES AUTO

All four wheels were stripped from the machine, and the body was crumpled into a mass of useless metal yesterday afternoon when the automobile of Dr. A. E. Goldsmith, 2201 North Alder, collided head-on with a Point Defiance car at Fourth and Broadway. Dr. Goldsmith was accompanied by his wife and three children. The machine remained upright after the accident, and none of the occupants were thrown out. Dr. Goldsmith's vision was obstructed by rain on his windshield. Both street car and auto were traveling at a good rate of speed when the collision occurred. Mrs. Q. Ostlund ran in front of George Lovett's auto at 14th and K streets yesterday afternoon, and was knocked to the pavement, suffering a broken leg and arm. Dr. Karschner, the Seattle physician whose machine collided with a Portland avenue car yesterday morning, suffered a fractured rib, X-ray examination showed. He is not seriously hurt.

## SINGS TO PRISONERS

The singing of an Indian maiden, Lizzie Ajax, who had been taken into custody for having celebrated Thanksgiving not wisely but too well, created such an impression on male prisoners at the city jail last evening that the entire prison remained absolutely quiet and listened eagerly to the song. The girl was in another part of the jail, but her clear soprano tones carried to every corner of the place. A few noisy, ribald prisoners who thought their own music was more important than the Indian girl's, were immediately sat upon and forcibly quieted by their cellmates.

## SEND GIFTS EARLY

Only 24 more shopping days until Christmas. Postmaster General Burleson has written instructions to Postmaster Stewart of Tacoma to impress on the people of the city the importance of giving their packages an early start to insure a timely arrival at their destination. The Christmas mail this year is expected to be larger than ever before in the history of the department. Special effort will be made by the local postal authorities to move the mail as quickly as possible to avoid congestion, but much can be done by sending holiday parcels now instead of later.

## TREES BLOCK TRACKS

Patrons of the Pacific Traction car line yesterday probably suffered more from the storm than those in any other part of the city. At noon two large trees fell across the Traction tracks at Manitou, obstructing traffic and tearing down transmission and trolley wires. It was two hours before the track was cleared. Shortly afterward a trolley pole was uprooted by the wind near the north end of the line, causing further delay, and toward evening the cars were again stopped when power supplying all street car lines was interrupted for an hour or more.

## HERE TO BUY WHEAT

John V. Peral, Peruvian milling king, who arrived in Tacoma yesterday to purchase 20,000 tons of wheat for milling in South America, is of the opinion that the U. S. is making a grave mistake by not starting an immense merchant marine during the European war. Peral said he was unaware of the importance of the northwest as a wheat center until the war cut off the Australian market and his company was forced to seek other markets.

## BOOM IN SHIPPING

Shipping in Tacoma will be greatly augmented during the next few days by the arrival from the Orient of four vessels. There are already several vessels in port loading general cargoes. The Manila Maru left on its first trip last night, carrying a cargo valued at \$650,000. The liners expected today are the Sado Maru, Sinalo, Tosan Maru, Tathiybus and possibly the Nichiyu Maru.

## TORNADO HITS CITY

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 26.—A terrible tornado which swept over the city yesterday left as its toll 10 dead and more than 20 seriously injured. Several expensive homes, including the Hot Springs Country club, were completely demolished.
