72 WIN LINCOLN HONORS

While nearly twice as many girls as boys crept into the honor roll this year at Lincoln Park high school, the three leaders were boys. Seventy-two, as compared with 56 last year, reached the coveted 90 per cent mark as an average in the four main subjects carried.

Another feature in the scholastic standing recorded this year is the decrease in failure. There were only 17 failures in a single subject as compared with 66 of the previous year, while 15 students, two less than last year, flunked in three courses.

Only one student "busted" his four courses. Last year five flunked in everything.

SAYS WARREN COMPANY ISN'T SHOWN FAVORS

George C. Warren, president of Warren Bros., manufacturers of Warrenite pavements, testified today in cross-examination in the Stellacoom boulevard paving case that the only difference between his pavement and any other good asphaltic pavement was the addition of a patent flux and the inspection given the Garren product.

He admitted much of the Warren pavement was manufactured at independent plants and that it was entirely possible to make good asphalt, but that it was not generally done as the inspection is often negligent. He though his company had a trade mark, but didn't know what it was.

He said that the Warren Construction Co., although holders of the bitulthic patent, were not favored nor backed in obtaining paving contracts any more than any other licensed company.
