

WOMEN DOING MEN'S WORK IN GREAT IRON FOUNDRIES



Holding Down Men's Jobs. In two Cleveland foundries 300 women run great punching and drilling machines. Katha Rodska, 20, is shown operating a big steel press while its 48-inch fly wheel whirls close to her head.

CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 2.—All over this land women are stepping in and doing more and more of man's work.

In iron mills, foundries and machine shops as well as office and factories. Girls now operate iron and steel moulding machines instead of office typewriters.

They work at the forge as well as in the leather factory. They help turn out engines and boilers as well as paper boxes.

Every morning when the 6 o'clock whistle blows in this city 300 women start big machines a-going in two big foundries operated by the Cleveland Hardware Co.

Side by side with men in greasy overalls they toil eight hours a day operating huge punching, drilling and trimming presses.

Hands that ordinarily would be busy washing dishes or caring for baby, enclosed in greasy smeared leather gloves and guide great masses of clashing metal and whirling wheels.

Women wanted — good pay. That's the sort of signs you see all around that part of Cleveland!

PRATT AND BEAN LINE UP PROGRAM

Chairman Pratt of the board of directors of the Stone-Webster corporation, parent concern of the Tacoma Railway & Power Co., is in executive session in Seattle today with Manager Bean of the T. R. & P., and other high officials of the Tacoma and Seattle street railway systems.

That Pratt will come to Tacoma immediately to deal with the city council on a new proposition regarding the power franchise, auxiliary power contract and street car franchises, was the opinion expressed by Commissioner Atkins today.

"Won," Says Mayor. "We've already won the fight," said Mayor Fawcett today.

"I have an idea that this man from Boston will call off the auxiliary power scheme, understanding, as he must, the antagonistic attitude of the people of Tacoma."

"It looks to me as if Manager Bean and the others interested in this deal found that they were getting into something deeper than they expected, and they sent an S. O. S. call to Boston for someone to come and help them."

Wants Sixth Avenue Extended. Fawcett explained that he would insist on the Sixth avenue car line extension, in exchange for permitting the T. R. & P. to use the Tacoma avenue fill.

"There's an immense territory out in the West End school section that is not tapped by cars," said Fawcett. "It has a great many more residents than on Pacific avenue. I am asking for an extension of the Sixth avenue line to Stevens, and thence north to 34th street. This would permit the company to operate a trunk system in a great loop through the most thickly settled district in Tacoma."

Hendley Shown Up By Report

Tacoma labor leaders interested in electing Walter L. Johnson to the school board feel the report issued yesterday, recommending changes in the city schools for increased fire protection, bears out their contention that Rev. Hendley has been laboring under false ideas.

They point to a recent statement made by him to the effect that it was impossible to make any of the Tacoma schools safe from the hazards. They believe the fire commissioner's report shows the fallacy of such a statement.

Thomas Bishoff, secretary of the labor committee, said today that Johnson realizes it is impossible to make a school building absolutely fireproof, but insists that many improvements can be made. He asks that every protection that modern knowledge and workmanship can afford be supplied.

Justice to the children in cleaning buildings of rubbish is another phase which Johnson thinks the present board fell down on. He believes to future citizens of Tacoma should be given every possible protection so that investigations such as the one just completed should not be necessary.

ORDINANCE NO. 6267—AN ORDINANCE providing for the condemnation, under the right of eminent domain, by the City of Tacoma, of a strip of land for the purpose of opening an alley between Tacoma Avenue and G Street from South 34th Street to South 36th Street, and providing for the payment therefor by an assessment against the property benefited.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TACOMA: Section 1. That the City Attorney be and is hereby authorized and directed to institute and prosecute to a determination in the Superior Court of the State of Washington for Pierce County, an action in the name of the City of Tacoma for the condemnation of a strip of land sixteen feet in width between Tacoma Avenue and "G" Street from South 34th Street to South 36th Street, said strip of land being more particularly described as follows: The west eight (8) feet of block 4, and the east eight (8) feet of block 3, Cavender and Holt's Addition to Fern Hill.

Section 2. Payment in whole for said strip of land so to be condemned shall be by assessment against the property benefited thereby, as provided by law. Section 3. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as a waiver on the part of the City of Tacoma of its right to decline to take any pay for said land in the manner above set forth, should it so elect, after the amount of damages has been determined in said action. ORDINANCE NO. 6269—AN ORDINANCE providing for the improvement of Wilkeson Street from South 30th Street to the Flume Line right of way, creating Local Improvement District No. 962; providing for a special fund for the payment of the cost of said improvement by special assessment upon property within said district benefited thereby; providing for the issuance of local improvement bonds; and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, an initial resolution adopted by the Council of the City of Tacoma on November 3rd, 1915, declaring the intention of said Council to make the improvement hereinafter described and fixing Monday, November 22nd, 1915, as the time for hearing objections to the making of said improvement, was duly published as provided by law;

WHEREAS, prior to the 22nd day of November, 1915, the Commissioner of Public Works said City submitted to said Council the estimated cost of said improvement in the sum of \$67,800, and in compliance with the proportionate amount thereof which should be borne by the property within the proposed assessment district, in the sum of \$67,800; and a statement of the aggregate assessed value of the real estate, exclusive of improvements, within said district, to which the valuation last placed upon it for the purposes of general taxation, in the sum of \$265,000, and a diagram or print showing thereon the lots, tracts or parcels of land and other property which are specially benefited by said improvement and the estimated amount of the cost and expense of the improvement to be borne by each lot, tract or parcel of land within said district; and

WHEREAS, on said 22nd day of November, 1915, no objections to the making of said improvement were made or presented to the Council; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TACOMA: Section 1. That Wilkeson Street from South 30th Street to the Flume Line right of way, be improved by grading to the established grade with a roadway thirty feet in width, and a sidewalk and parking space on each side thereof fifteen feet in width, constructed of concrete curbs and crosswalks of plank, and lay-

ing down on said sidewalk spaces concrete walks five feet in width, according to the plans and specifications heretofore prepared therefor by the City Engineer, now on file in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Section 2. That the real property to be benefited by said improvement and which is hereby created, Local Improvement District No. 962, is described as follows: Lots 1 to 15, inclusive, in Block 24, Lots 4 to 15 inclusive in Block 24, Plat of Carroll & Hannah Add. to Tacoma, W. T.

All of said property being in the City of Tacoma, Pierce County, Washington.

Section 3. An assessment is hereby levied upon the several lots, tracts and parcels of land in said local improvement district for the purpose of defraying the cost of said improvement, in accordance with the laws of the State of Washington and Ordinance No. 4611 of said City.

Said assessment so levied upon said lots, tracts and parcels of land respectively may be paid either in cash, without interest, before the issuance of bonds, or in five equal annual installments, together with interest on the whole sum so charged at six per cent per annum; and each year after the issuance of the bonds hereinafter provided for one of such installments, together with the interest due thereon, and interest thereon, shall be collected in the manner provided by law and the Charter and ordinances of the City of Tacoma for the collection of assessments for local improvements.

Section 4. A special fund is hereby created in the treasury of the City of Tacoma for the collection of assessments for local improvements, District No. 962, which shall consist in the aggregate of the several amounts of money levied and collected upon the several lots and parcels of land in said local improvement district for the purpose of said improvement, out of said fund shall be paid the bonds, interest thereon, except solely upon said fund of said improvement, and no part of said fund shall become the property of the City of Tacoma, but shall be held in trust for the purpose hereinafter indicated.

Section 5. The Commissioner of Public Works is hereby ordered to proceed with said improvement by letting a contract for the construction of the same, after inviting bids therefor in the manner provided by the City Charter, and make out and certify to an assessment roll, charging the cost and expense of said improvement against said lots, tracts and parcels of land in the manner provided by law.

In calling for bids the Commissioner of Public Works shall state that the contractor doing the work shall agree to accept at par the bonds issued in pursuance of this ordinance, and shall have no claim whatever on account thereof against the City of Tacoma, except solely upon said bonds, the special assessment made and the fund hereby created.

Section 6. Under the provisions of Chapter 98 of the Code of the State of Washington of 1911, and this ordinance, there shall be issued five-year annual installment local improvement bonds against said district amounting in the aggregate to a sum equal to the amount of said assessment remaining unpaid at the time of its issuance, but not in excess of the amount of said assessment, which bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from the date of their issuance, and be in denominations of \$100.00 each, except the first numbered bond, which may be for a less sum if necessary.

Said bonds shall be issued and dated not less than thirty days after the expiration of the time when said assessment may be paid without interest, penalty or cost, as fixed by the City Treasurer's notice of the assessment roll being in his hands for collection.

Section 7. An emergency exists and this ordinance shall take effect immediately after publication. Passed Dec. 1, 1915.
