

BEST TO DO YOUR HUNTING SITTING DOWN, SAYS INDIAN

You should look for his hair, for the sun shining on his horns or for something moving. Then, maybe, you see more.

When snow is on the ground, look for a rock or log that has no snow on it. That is, a moose or deer lying down.

Always you keep looking. Walk a little, look a lot. Look a lot more.

And you should listen. You might hear him walking or biting off branches. Once I heard a gee-to-mo (squirrel) talking angrily. I went there, very still. Gee-to-mo was cussing big deer. I shot him.

When you are still you can see easiest what is moving. If you are moving maybe he will see you first.

My father's father told me it was best for me to do most hunting sitting down. My father's father was a smart Injun.

The moose is not afraid of wolves like Washkiah, the deer, so acts different and must be hunted different. The moose lives farther back in the woods. He has longer legs, can travel farther and walk through swamps better.

The deer is afraid to sleep in the same bed twice. The moose is not. Maybe you see where a moose had laid down. No use to hunt there then. Maybe in two or three weeks he will be back. Watch for his tracks.

The moose likes to sleep on a side hill where he can look around.

The moose can be followed better than the deer. He does not look behind so much. He is not so afraid. Sometimes he will stop at the top of a hill to look back. If you were close you can shoot at him from the hill behind.

The he-moose takes longer steps than the she-moose. His horns break bushes and take bark off trees.

If you look for all of a moose you may never see one.

DIDN'T NEED AID. WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 8.—That the coast guard cutter McCulloch started to aid the crippled Minnesota off lower California, but returned to San Diego when the Minnesota witnessed the advice that aid was not needed, became known at coast guard headquarters here this afternoon.

GET SMALL TOWNS. SOFIA, Dec. 8.—Bulgarians this afternoon occupied Dibra Besna and the villages of Madovo and Miranmer, near the Albanian frontier, an official announcement said.

FORT EXPLODES. LONDON, Dec. 8.—Eighty Germans were killed this afternoon in an explosion of a Namur fort on the western battlefield, according to a report.

BUSINESS GAINING SALEM, Ore., Dec. 8.—The combined statement of all banks of Oregon for November 10 shows a decided business improvement, State Bank Superintendent Sargent said today. It is the most satisfactory since September, 1914, indicating a rapid return to normal.

BOY-ED TO GO? NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—There were unconfirmed reports here today that German Attaché Boy-Ed and von Papen will depart for Germany Tuesday. Steamship offices said no reservations had been made.

NEED WATERWAYS WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 8.—Expressing the fear that the coming commercial development will swamp the railroads, Secretary of Commerce Redfield told the National Rivers and Harbors convention here today that the nation's waterways must be developed.
