FAREWELL TO ARMY

LONDON, Dec. 20.—"In relinquishing command of the British army in France, I wish to express to the officers and men with whom I have been closely associated during the last 16 months my heartfelt sorrow in parting with them before the campaign in which we have been so long engaged together has been brought to a victorious conclusion.
This was the statement issued by Sir John French before leaving the army on the western front. He arrived in Paris from the front last night.
