BARE LEGS TABOOED

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 29.—Bare legs and shady stories were barred from performances in theaters in this city yesterday by Chief of Police Robinson. All patrolmen were notified to stop shows where they find this line of entertainment. He classifies the following features as immoral and indecent: Appearance of a female performer in nude or semi-nude condition, with the body or lower limbs naked; exhibition of picture of any female performer in a suggestive pose; portrayal of a dope fiend; profane or immoral language, jokes or stories.

ANOTHER \$500,000

Additional construction at the Tacoma smelter to cost nearly \$500,000, including a sulphuric acid manufacturing plant to be run in connection with the smelter, has been authorized by the American Smelting & Refining Co., the holding corporation, according to word from New York today. Plans are being drawn for the new plant. On the bluff just behind the high stack a large steel and brick building will be constructed that will house the smoke sifting equipment. Scientific investigation of the possibilities of manufacturing sulphuric acid was made here recently, says W. R. Rust, retiring president.

ARGOSY HAS GRIPPE

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 29.—La grippe is on the rampage among members of the Ford peace party. The party has found it necessary to extend its stay in Stockholm until Thursday and will arrive in Copenhagen Friday. A corps of Red Cross nurses has been appointed to attend the stricken members. A majority of them caught cold in the biting weather they struck in Christiania. Andrew J. Bethea, lieutenant governor of South Carolina is one of those who are ill.

LAUD SEAMEN'S LAW

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 29.—Secretary of Labor Wilson joined members of the American Association for Labor Legislation in annual convention here yesterday in strong praise and defense of the new seamen law, which some shipping men have declared will drive all American ships from the seas. Wilson declared the law has achieved for American seamen the first step toward real freedom. "Better no American merchant marine than a merchant marine with no American mariners," was the declaration of Henry W. Farnum, professor of political economy at Yale university.

NEW BUNCO GAME

SEATTLE, Dec. 29.—U. S. secret service agents here believe today they have unearthed a new kind of bunco game by which victims are robbed in the belief that they are to make money out of a counterfeiting scheme. The game was discovered yesterday in the arrest of Barney King, Sam Tholeson and a man giving his name as King Wilson. The plan is to show "easy marks" a "money box" which they are told is a machine for making \$5 gold pieces. They are then coaxed for cash with which to "buy supplies."

PENSION; HOLDS JOB

SEATTLE, Dec. 29.—Frank Stewart, conductor on the Lake Burien municipal car line, who was pensioned at \$18 a month for the loss of a leg in an accident last March, is back on the job with a wooden leg and is drawing full pay as a conductor in addition to his pension money. This state of affairs was accidentally discovered by the city council public utilities committee and is raising a neat little controversy in the city hall. Stewart's case is without precedent.

TO OUST OSBORNE

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 29.—As soon as a successor can be named, Thomas Mott Osborne, "millionaire warden" of Sing Sing prison, will be removed from office. This action was announced yesterday by John Riley, superintendent of prisons, after he had learned of the indictment returned by the grand jury against Osborne. Gov. Whitman declared the charges against the warden were entirely unfounded and said he was astonished at the action of the grand jury. The indictment charged perjury and misconduct in office.

DEMANDS DEATH

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 29.—Summing up the evidence of six weeks, Deputy District Attorney Keys today informed the jury that the extreme penalty of death was demanded by the state for Mathew A. Schmidt, on trial as a leader of the gang which dynamited the Los Angeles Times building five years ago, killing 20 people. The trial was hampered again yesterday by the illness of one of the jurors. Closing arguments for the defense are expected to begin today.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 28.—The supreme court today upheld the workmen's compensation act. Justice McBride declared that it would be a refraction of the republican form of government if the bill which passed the legislature almost unanimously and was affirmed by vote of the people were declared unconstitutional.

URBANA, Ohio, Dec. 28.—Two Pennsylvania railroad flyers in a head-on collision here today killed three trainmen, injuring others and sending a score of passengers to the hospital. The mistake of a tower man is believed to have been the cause.

\$100,000 KILN FIRE
PORTLAND, Dec. 28.—A fire starting in a dry kiln early this morning destroyed 200,000 feet of lumber in the plant of the Emerson Hardwood Company. The loss is estimated at \$100,000, fully insured.
