

Newest Boss of the Major Leagues Quit Plumber Job to Play Baseball



One day 22 years ago Jimmy Callahan, a youngster of Pittsburg, Mass., had to choose between a job as plumber's assistant at \$4.50 a week and a job with a baseball team which paid him \$25 a week for pitching two games. The plumber Jimmy helped decided the boy was taking too much time from his work. Jimmy was getting tired of carrying

Springfield in the Eastern league. He won 32 of the 41 games he pitched and helped win the pennant. He was drafted by Kansas City of the Western league and did so well in 1896 he was bought by the Chicago club, managed by Pop Anson. He was with the club four years then in the war which brought out the American league, jumped to the Chicago Sox.

He quit the majors and ran the Logan Square semi-pro club, playing two games a week. After being out of the majors five years he went back to the White Sox and was the only player who ever "came back" better than he was before. During part of the season of 1911 he batted over .300 and was a bear on the bases. At the close of the season he succeeded Hugh Duffy as manager. Callahan was in turn succeeded by Clarence Rowland, who ran the Sox last season. Now he is back in the game again as manager. He is 41 and broke into professional ball 21 years ago. He will be a uniformed manager, but won't play.
