CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 10.—You have heard a lot about the "best governed city in the United States"—Cleveland, which the late Tom Johnson made famous the world over as "the city with a soul!"

Well, wouldn't it give you a jolt to learn, that according to the official mind test used in the public schools on 12-year-old children, most of the officials who govern this remarkable municipality are "feeble minded?"

According to the much-discussed Binet test the ranks of the mentally unsound have been augmented by the following distinguished company:

- Finance director. County prosecutor. City tractioner. City clerk. County Clerk. Secretary of the civic league. Two municipal judges. County detective.

AND ALL THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION!

The Binet test, the invention of two French psychologists, has been under criticism for some time.

Under its provisions 1,647 public school pupils here have been declared to be mentally below par.

Parents of some of these children finally began to ask themselves, "What is this test under which our little one have been branded as feeble-minded?"

This started the inquiry which bids fair to make the Binet test one of the big questions in educational circles throughout the country.

Here are two sentences which children, under the Binet test, are expected to repeat after hearing them once:

"I saw in the street a pretty little dog. He had curly brown hair, short legs and a long tail."

A normal child of 12 is supposed to be able to re-

peat the sentence exactly. Not one of a score of grown-up Clevelanders, officials and private citizens, could do it.

When Finance Director Coughlin was asked to repeat the sentence, he made it this: "I saw in the street a little brown dog. He had curly hair, and a pretty short tail."

Other answers made it "long brown legs," or "short brown tail."

At a meeting of the board of education, called to discuss the test, Drs. A. B. Howard and H. H. Drysdale, alienists, told of many instances of children who failed to pass the test and later proved quite sane.

BOTH, RULES TANNER

Attorney General Tanner constructs the section of the prohibitory statute referring to the maximum amount of liquor allowed on hand by each individual as meaning that it is legal to have two quarts of liquor other than three cases of beer on the premises and 12 quarts of beer in ad-

dition. This opinion which was given out yesterday in Tacoma was made upon the request of the Lewis county prosecuting attorney.

Unless the attorney general reverses his opinion, permits in the future will be issued for the double order.

Prosecutor Remann disagrees with Tanner's interpretation of the statutes, but is not ready yet to say anything as to what would be done in Pierce county.
