

PRAISE FOR GROWERS

PUYALLUP, Jan. 14.—Lionel Smith-Gordon of Dublin, speaking at the Western Washington experiment station before the winter school students yesterday, had this to say about the Puyallup & Sumner Fruit Growers' association: "I have visited and studied the co-operative organization of 16 of the great nations of the world, but I have seen none that was as successful as your organization here in the Puyallup valley." Smith-Gordon is known as one of the world's authorities on the co-operative movement.

MUST TAKE A STAND

SEATTLE, Jan. 14.—"The leader in the journalistic field must always stand for something," said President Suzzallo of the University of Washington yesterday in the opening address before the fourth annual Washington Newspaper institute. "Strong leaders are blends of the alternating currents of the soul, impelled by kindness for humanity." The institute was called to order in Bagley hall by Prof. Frank G. Kane, head of the department of journalism.

OLD TIMER PASSES

After an illness of a year, Francis Smith Manley, Tacoma pioneer wholesale tobacco dealer, died at the Tacoma General hospital yesterday afternoon, at the age of 71. He suffered a serious relapse Monday when told of the death of his friend Maj. O. B. Hayden. He came to Tacoma in 1888, and entered the wholesale tobacco business. He is survived by a widow, a daughter and a son, all of Tacoma.

COLD GRIPS EAST

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—A cold wave has gripped the entire country between the Rocky Mountains and the great lakes. There is zero weather everywhere. It is the coldest January reported in years. Trains are from six to 12 hours late, due to the storms. Forecasters are hopeful for a relief before Saturday. It is predicted the thermometer will register 18 below here by tonight. It has dropped below the 60 mark in several Montana towns.

LINER FAST ON REEF

The Japanese steamer Kenkon Maru No. 3, which went ashore Wednesday on Belle Chain reef of Saturna Island while on her way to Vladivostok with a cargo of supplies for the Russian government, is still fast on the reef in a dangerous condition. Attempts to save her have been hampered by bad weather. Part of her deck cargo will probably have to be discharged before she can be floated.

GRANDFATHERS SORE

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 14.—Hundreds of aged men, some over 90 years of age, stormed the labor bureau's office today demanding money. They claimed they had been hired to play grandfather parts for the movies and were unpaid. The accused agents were ordered to appear.

FILE DEMANDS FOR WARM CARS

OLYMPIA, Jan. 14.—A formal complaint from the members of the Seattle city council was received yesterday by the public service commission, demanding that the Seattle Electric Co. be forced to heat their street cars and that the backs of the open cars be closed. The company is said to have refused to heat about 35 per cent of its cars, causing the riding public much suffering.

Yesterday's Late News

CALL GREEK QUEEN LONDON, Jan. 13.—Queen dje-patches today reported that the queen of Greece has been notified to go to Berlin on account of the illness of her brother, the kaiser, and is preparing to depart. This and similar rumors have been current for a fortnight.

WATER GIVES OUT SEATTLE, Jan. 13.—Because of the continued shortage of water, laundries, hydraulic elevators in all buildings here were ordered closed today in an effort to conserve the water supply. The pipe line is being prepared today. When the gates were opened the reservoirs contained only enough water to last 24 hours. Water users have been asked to refrain from scrubbing for a few days. Within a week there have been these breaks in

the pipe line. TERRIER FAITHFUL EL PASO, Jan. 13.—"Whiskers," an arldale terrier belonging to Manager Watson of the Coal mine, was faithful unto death when the 18 Americans were massacred. The rescuers found him watching over a pipe of American bodies. The dog led them to Watson's head which soft-nosed bullets had blown off. MONEY WORTHLESS SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.—Nearly all Mexican paper money is valueless because the de facto government has not authorized an issue of currency, contended an attorney who is defending two Mexicans who confessed to burning lithographic plates from a Mexican treasury.
