





PEACEITES GAMBLE?

Advocates of peace at any price are gamblers; their stakes are the blood of American sons and daughters. If we are a strong nation other nations will be slow to attack us, and should actual war come preparedness will bring about a short war. These were the declarations of President John Grier Hibben of Princeton university in an address on "preparedness" at the University club last night. Dr. Hibben gave a short talk to students of Stadium High school yesterday afternoon.

MAYOR PHONES N. Y.

Prohibition and the weather were the topics of a conversation carried on last night between Mayor Fawcett and a Mr. Wilmer of New York across some 3,400 miles of copper telephone wire. The conversation marked the formal opening of the transcontinental phone service here and took place at a private demonstration to employees and friends of the Sunset Telephone & Telegraph Co.

Tonight, Thursday and Friday nights there will be free demonstrations for the public in the Tacoma theater.

KAISER BROKEN MAN

LONDON, Jan. 26.—"The emperor's face is that of a tired, broken man. His hair is white, though his moustache is still suspiciously dark. He is greatly aged and is continually coughing. He is not a tall man as represented in his photographs."

This is the description of the German kaiser given by the Daily Mail correspondent, who saw the emperor at close range at a banquet in Nish.

WOULD BAR JAPS

SUMNER, Jan. 26.—A motion to bar Japanese from farming in the Puyallup valley was voted down by a big majority after a stormy session of the Puyallup & Sumner Fruit Growers' association in the Sumner theater last night. The meeting was called to air real or fancied grievances against the management.

It ended when a unanimous vote of confidence was given the management of the association by 200 present.

\$1,000 FOR RELIEF

The funds raised in Tacoma for relief of Jewish war sufferers in Europe will amount to more than \$1,000, according to the report of the local Jewish relief committee at its meeting yesterday. The committee declared Tacoma citizens have responded readily to the appeals for aid. The Ministerial Alliance has adopted resolutions asking all pastors to make the appeal to their congregations Sunday.

ORE RECEIPTS HEAVY

With two more steamers due, receipts of ore at the Tacoma smelter during the last few days have totaled more than 11,000 tons. The steamer Northwest is expected today from Alaska with 1,500 tons of copper ore, and the Norwegian steamer Cuzco is expected from South America with 4,000 tons.

U. S. HAS OBSERVERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 26.—That there is an American observer with the armies of each belligerent nation and that their reports to the war department have been of great value in making new army plans, became known following the appearance yesterday of Col. Charles G. Treat of the army war college before the senate military committee.

CALL TO ARMS AT MEETING

SEATTLE, Jan. 26.—Business men representing nearly every interest in Seattle met in the State Hotel Men's association, presided at the mass meeting.

After telling how Secretary Yandell and the chamber of commerce refused to give any aid in the fight to wipe out the unjust differential maintained by the Southern Pacific, Union Pacific, and O.-W. railroads against Seattle, Chairman C. A. Reynolds of the public service commission, chief speaker, said:

"He Wouldn't Help Them. 'If I were a business man in Seattle, if I ran a restaurant, or a hotel, or a boat, I wouldn't contribute one dollar to any organization which refused to aid in giving us a fair show in transportation rates.'"

"No, I am not for a boycott of the O.-W.," the speaker said. "What I say is this: Let the business men of Seattle and the Northwest who have been giving their trade to the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and the Milwaukee lines quit these companies and give the business now to the O.-W."

He Gets Sarcastic. "If a person smites you on the cheek, give him the other cheek, too."

"If he kicks you once, stoop down and let him kick you again."

"That's the chamber's policy in this matter."

Reynolds was cheered again and again by a crowd which filled every seat.

He explained how the Southern allied railroads had combined to keep tourist travel out of the Northwest by offering lower rates from Chicago to San Francisco and return via Southern routes, and placing the \$17.50 differential against the price of return tickets routed through the Northwest.
