LUMBERMEN LIKE IT

During January the output in Western Washington and Oregon was only 20 per cent of normal, a curtailment just such as the millmen have been wanting to bring about, and at the same time the demand for lumber increased greatly, due to the destruction of oil rigs and bridges in California and elsewhere. As soon as the camps are able to reopen, great lumbering activity is predicted.

HAVE 26-FT. CHANNEL

HOQUIAM, Feb. 3.—As the result of work done during the last three months by the government dredger Col. P. S. Michie, the channel has been deepened to a uniform depth of 26 feet at low tide (34 to 35 at high tide), the greatest depth Grays Harbor ever has had. Monday the vessel will return to Grays Harbor for overhauling, later to go to Coos bay.


FORTUNE IN SILK

4000-VOLT WIRES HIT; AT 13TH ST.

A huge chunk of snow dropped by a shoveler from the roof of a building at 13th and Pacific avenue occupied by the Kimball Gun store late yesterday afternoon, caused one of the most brilliant displays of pyrotechnics ever seen in Tacoma. The snow fell on two primary wires of the city light system, and because it was wet, formed a conductor for the electricity. With a flash and a roar that was heard for blocks the high tension "juice" shot through the chunk of snow, melting it instantly. The "short circuit" formed by the snow blew out a transformer, and patrons supplied by the wires were without electricity for 30 minutes.
