

DOPE ON SPORT PAGES WINS FOR HIM, SAPS BOY WONDER

Joe Stecher, the phenomenal young wrestler brought from oblivion by the revival of the mat game, says many of his matches have been won for him by newspapers.

"On account of the dope written about me I am known as the chap with a wonderful leg scissors hold," says Stecher. "It has been written that I have a squeezing pressure of several thousand pounds in my legs and that the hold I use is deadly. In fact, the leg scissors has become as famous as the Gutch toe hold.

"Consequently, every wrestler I meet is on the lookout for the scissors grip, and he leaves openings for other holds.

"I have not used the scissors on half of my bouts. I know and use other holds, just like other wrestlers do. Half the time I do not have to think about using the scissors because my opponent, in protecting himself from the grip, lets me slam on the half-Nelson or some other good hold.

"The unexpected counts in wrestling as in boxing, baseball or business."

Stecher is just a big boy, only 22 years of age. In street clothes he looks like a school boy. But beneath his little checkered cap are more brains than the average wrestler has, and beneath his neat fitting suit are arms and legs of rare strength.

Stecher scales around 200, but seems small for the weight. At that, he is light for the heavy-weight wrestling game. Most of the men he meets outweigh him many pounds and a lot of them are of the "bruiser" type.

The boy has had 51 bouts. His shoulders have never touched the mat. He won the American championship by defeating Charley Cutler, a veteran at the game, then defended the title against American, Hussane, the Turk, and others.

In the international tournament at New York he defeated the sensational Masked Marvel, and is in the running for the \$10,000 to be given the winner of the tourney.

WHITE NAMED REFEREE FOR COMING BOUT

NEW YORK, Feb. 11—Charlie White of New York will act as referee for the 10-round match to be staged at Madison Square Garden March 8 between Jess Willard and Frank Moran. He was referee for the last big heavyweight match, when Jack Johnson won from Jim Jeffries at Reno, July 4, 1910. He formerly refereed all of Tex Rickard's bouts.

The referee was chosen by the flip of a coin after the managers of the two boxers had eliminated the names of all proposed referees except White and Jack Skelly.
