MUST COUNT BACKWARD

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—Hereafter, folks arrested by New York police will have to count backward from 20 to 1. This is to test their mental capacity and find out if they are defectives. "What ought one to do when one has missed a train?" is one of a list of questions which will be hurled at the prisoners when they are arrested. They will be asked to give three words that rhyme with "day," "spring" and "mill," and also will be told to explain the difference between flies and butterflies, etc.

LUMBER MILL IS BURNED

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18.—Fire in the operating plant of the Inman-Poulson mill here yesterday destroyed property valued at \$150,000. The cause has not been learned. The fire started under the double circular saw of the mill. It was controlled before it spread to the lumber in the yards. The mill was the largest on the river and had a 10-hour capacity of 360,000 feet of lumber.

ARSENAL IN BASEMENT

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Maj. Gen. O'Ryan of the national guard of New York has asked the police for information concerning a quantity of arms and ammunition stored in a building in West Houston street here. During a fire in the building it was discovered that 2,000 revolvers, 7,000 rifles and 2,500,000 cartridges were stored in the basement. The building is leased by a dealer in firearms, said to be an agent for the Krupp gun works of Germany.

GOVERNMENT UNDER FIRE

LONDON, Feb. 18.—The governments method of dealing with the merchant marine was attacked by a score of members in the house of commons yesterday. Arthur J. Balfour, first lord of the admiralty, replied that while the situation was far from satisfactory the government is doing its utmost to make things better. It was charged that the high freight rates were due to a waste of tonnage caused by government mismanagement.

GIVES CARRANZA CREDIT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 18.—That the Carranza de facto government is affording "reasonably adequate protection to the lives and property of American citizens, was the statement of Secretary Lansing in his letter to the senate yesterday giving President Wilson's response to the request for facts leading up to Carranza's recognition. He reported that 76 Americans were killed in Mexico in 1913-1915, as compared with 74 in the three years preceding.

Fleury, charging conspiracy of "higher-ups" in the industrial insurance looting case, is being sought today as a witness for the defense in the trial of J. F. Gillies. A subpoena was issued for him yesterday afternoon. Fleury took it to Seattle with instructions to get Sheriff Hodge to aid in finding Little. The defense continued its fight today in the trial of Gillies on a grand larceny charge, offering testimony similar to that introduced in the forgery case.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 18.—Repeal of the free sugar clause in the Underwood tariff bill was approved yesterday by the democratic caucus of the house by a vote of 84 to 20. It is believed the repeal will pass both houses before May 1.
