IT'S HI AND GRIFFITHS

SEATTLE, Feb. 22.—Mayor Hiram C. Gill and Austin E. Griffiths, former councilman and former chief of police in the early days of the Gill administration, will oppose each other as candidates at the city elections next month. Complete returns from yesterday's primaries gave Gill 30,845 votes; Griffiths, 15,932; Oliver T. Erickson, 9,724, and Raymer, 1,910. Hugh M. Caldwell will oppose James E. Bradford, the present incumbent, for corporation counsel. For three seats in the council the candidates are: Former Mayor William Hickman Moore, Former City Engineer Reginald H. Thompson, Councilman C. B. Fitzgerald, Former County Auditor Otto E. Case, Dr. Edwin Brown and Councilman Charles Marble.

WAR CREDIT ASTOUNDING

LONDON, Feb. 22.—War credit of 420,000,000 pounds sterling was voted by the house of commons last night. This is expected to carry on the war until the end of May! The total amount appropriated by votes of credit since the beginning of the war has been 2,082,000,000 pounds. A sum which Premier Asquith says is "not only beyond precedent, but beyond the imagination of any financier of this or any other country." Even if England should end the war with a debt of 5,000,000 pounds (approximately \$25,000,000,000) the burden would not be crushing, according to Lord Inchcape, the English financier and statesman, here today.

WHAT'S THE FIRST JOB?

What ought to be the first definite accomplishments of the reorganized Tacoma Commercial club? This is the question which all members of the Members' council of the club will be asked to answer at their general meeting tomorrow noon. The meeting will be in the nature of an open forum. The members' council trustees got together yesterday and appointed their managing committee: President F. C. Brewer, John Hartman, W. H. Pringue, H. E. O'Neal, William Carruthers, H. N. Tinker and L. F. Gault.

WIRELESS PREPAREDNESS

"A democracy requires that a people who govern and educate themselves should be so armed and disciplined that they can protect themselves." This was the message from Col. Nicholson, U. S. A., which came through the air last night to Walter Kleist at his wireless station on South Yakima avenue. Kleist was one of 5,000 amateur wireless operators to receive and transmit the message. The idea was to demonstrate the use of amateur wireless sets and prove how operators might be of service in time of trouble.

CABINET MEMBERS STICK

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 21.—Secretaries Houston and Lane both have been eliminated from consideration for the position of secretary of war by President Wilson, it was learned today. It is said the president believes both of these cabinet officers are so well fitted to handle their present jobs that he wouldn't wish to transfer them. He is understood to have several middle western lawyers in mind.

CALL BANKER WITNESSES

OLYMPIA, Feb. 22.—The defense in the trial of former Claim Agent J. F. Gillies, charged with grand larceny, yesterday called five employees of the Olympic National bank, all of whom testified that Gillies had not cashed the Don L. Jones warrant for \$1,064, on which the charges of fraud against him are based. Court was adjourned until Wednesday, when the case is expected to go to the jury.

AGREE ON DEFENSE PLAN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 22.—The house military committee yesterday reached an agreement on the outline of the army bill it will unanimously present for passage, thus carrying the national preparedness legislation a long step forward. The measures are a substitute for the continental army plan advocated by former Secretary of War Garrison.

SHOT BY TONG MEMBERS

PORTLAND, Feb. 22.—Pursued through the streets of Chinatown, Wong Ching, aged member of the Bing King tong, was finally cornered and fatally shot last night by four Chinese gunmen, alleged to belong to the Hop Sing tong. The shooting was said to be an act of revenge by the Hop Sings for the shooting last week of Jung Wah by Lo Gong, a Bing King member.

PLACE BLAME FOR WRECK

SPOKANE, Feb. 22.—Blame for the rear-end collision Sunday at South Cheney, where five passengers were killed, was placed by a coroner's jury yesterday on the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway. The company was charged with "lack of proper system." The trainmen on both the North Coast Limited and Burlington No. 42 trains were absolved from all blame.

KNIGHTS HAVE BIRTHDAY

Celebrating the 52nd anniversary of their organization in the state of Washington, Commencement lodge No. 1, Knights of Pythias, held a big meeting last night. More than 300 persons attended. The chief address was made by Stephen Appleby on "Preparedness."


