All photoplay acting is pantomime. Not in the sense that the director or professional refers to pantomime, but as the man in the audience sees it. Pantomime to the professional, meaning the player, is "mugging" a part, or "acting" it. Pantomime to the man in the audience is conveying thought and emotion by means of body movements, without conversation.
