Tacoma Elks are completing the dedication of their new Temple today with a flare of hands and a sumptuous display of elegant costumes.

The three days' celebration comes to an end this evening with a formal grand ball in the new temple, for Elks and invited friends. It is expected that 1,500 couples will attend.

Following the grand parade this afternoon, in which 3,000 Elks from the entire northwest united, the formal dedicatory services of the new Temple were held.

The district deputy grand exalted ruler was in charge. The dedication was for members only. Ralph E. Moody of Portland delivered the oration.

Frank B. Leslie, exalted ruler of the Tacoma lodge, will lead the grand march at tonight's ball. For those who do not dance, there will be a concert by the Thule male chorus in the lodge rooms.

All yesterday afternoon and last night the Temple was thrown open to the public. It was estimated that 10,000 persons had inspected the new building up to today.

Tacoma members will begin using the Temple as their club quarters tomorrow.

Two big parades through the downtown streets, several patriotic meetings, a number of banquets, and a general cessation of business mark the most important observances of the day.

Under orders from the state headquarters, members of the national guard, including troops B, the coast artillery reserves, naval militia and cavalry, marched from the armory in charge of Capt. Hart W. Palmer early this afternoon and paraded through the city.

More than 3,000 Elks, with several bands, held their annual Washington's birthday parade. Besides the Tacoma Elks in their silk hats and Prince Alberts, there were delegations in line from Portland, Seattle, Olympia, Houghton, Aberdeen, Cheney, Everett, Bellingham, Bremerton, Ballard, Spokane and North Yakima. Among the bands were those of Portland and Olympia Elks.

A banquet will be given at the Masonic temple tonight with 300 covers. Charles D. Atkins will be toastmaster.

LEGAL NOTICES

RESOLUTION NO. 6553
 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

1. That the Council deems it necessary and expedient that the charter of the city be amended by the amendment of Section 184 of Article XIV relating to Civil Service.

2. That it is the intention of the Council of the City of Tacoma to offer to the qualified electors of Tacoma at the general election to be held Tuesday, April 4th, 1916, the following amendment to the City Charter, to-wit: Amend said Section 184 of Article XIV thereof so that the same shall read as follows:

Sec. 184. Whenever any employee of the City of Tacoma under civil service, shall have been discharged, the head of the department in which he was employed shall, upon the request of such employee, be held within five days after his discharge, and if such employee shall be discharged, he shall be discharged to the head of said department, he shall be given a public hearing upon the merits of such reasons before a Joint Advisory Board. Said Board shall be composed of the President of the Civil Service Board, who shall be the chairman thereof, two members selected by the head of said department, and two members who shall be selected by the City Controller from the employees of some other department of the city. That in which the person discharged was employed. Said hearing shall be held within five days after said request is made, and at such time and place as the Chairman of said Board shall direct. Upon the hearing it shall be the duty of the Board to determine if said employee was discharged without just cause, and if so, to reinstate him in the position formerly held by him in the City's service, but he shall not be entitled to wages or salary from the City from the time of his discharge up to the time of his reinstatement. The decision of the Board shall be final and shall be in writing, signed by at least a majority of the members of said board, one copy of which shall be delivered to the head of said department and one copy to the City Controller.

3. That the Clerk be directed to publish this resolution as a notice in two daily newspapers, published and of general circulation in said City for thirty days immediately after the adoption of this resolution; and

4. That on Wednesday, March 8, 1916, or on such other day as the matter may be then adjourned, the Council will again vote upon said amendment.
