

Teamsters Are Working More Than 8 Hours

Mayor Fawcett presented a tabulated list to the city council today showing that 12 city teamsters had worked nine and ten hours on Feb. 16, instead of the eight hours specified by state law for municipal employees.

The list had been prepared by Rea Last, secretary of the Central Labor Council, as part of the labor unions' attempt to force Commissioner Woods to cut down working hours of teamsters. Some of the men reported for work at 6 a. m. and did not finish until after 5 p. m., it was shown.

"The trouble is that we ask the men to curry their own horses and stable them down," said Woods today. "We're not working them overtime. But I don't think it is more than right that they should take care of their horses a little."
