LEGAL NOTICES

RESOLUTION NO. 657
 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

1. That the Council deems it necessary and expedient that the Charter of the City be amended by the amendment of section 184 of Article XIV relating to Civil Service.

2. That it is the intention of the Council of the City of Tacoma to offer to the qualified electors of the City, at the general election to be held Tuesday, April 4th, 1916, the following amendment to the Charter of the City: Amend section 184 of Article XIV thereof so that the same shall read as follows:

Sec. 184. Whenever any employee of the City of Tacoma under civil service, shall have been discharged, the head of the department in which he was employed shall, upon the request of such employee, furnish to him in writing, immediately setting forth the reasons for his discharge, and if such employee shall, within five days after his discharge, make a written request therefor to the head of said department, he shall be given a public hearing upon the efficiency of such reasons before a Joint Advisory Board. Said Board shall be composed of the President of the Civil Service Board, who shall be the chairman thereof, two members selected by the head of the department, and two members who shall be selected by the City Controller from the employees of some other department of the City than that in which the person discharged was employed. Said hearing shall be held within five days after said request is made and at such time and place as the Chairman of said Board shall direct. Upon said hearing if said Board shall find or determine that said employee was discharged immediately because he shall be immediately reinstated in the position formerly held by him in the City's service, but he shall not be entitled to wages or salary from the City from the time of his discharge until the time of his reinstatement. The decision of said board shall be final and shall be without interest, at least a majority of the members of said board, one copy of which shall be delivered to the head of the department and one copy to the City Controller.

That the Clerk be directed to publish this resolution in two daily newspapers, published and of general circulation in said City, for thirty days immediately after the adoption of this resolution; and that on Wednesday, March 8, 1916, or on such other day as the matter may be then adjudged to be held, the roll call be taken upon said amendment.

Adopted on roll call, Yeas 3, Nays 2, Mills, Woods, Absent 0.

RAW ALCOHOL JAGS WORRY POLICE NOW

"Alcohol jags" are the latest worry of the Tacoma police department.

Commissioner Mills, with Chief Smith and Police Capt. Read held a long conference today in an attempt to plan some means of coping with the sale and consumption of raw alcohol in Tacoma. They gave up in despair.

"It's just one of the features of this punk prohibition law of ours," said Mills. "He only he didn't say 'punk'—he used a stronger word."

Everyone who used to drink whisky is drinking alcohol now, getting just as drunk after having just as much fun. And we are powerless to stop them."

Three boys from South Tacoma and several men from other parts of the city were arrested last night for being intoxicated. In each case the inebriety had been caused by drinking alcohol.

The police investigated and found the alcohol had been purchased legally in each case at drug stores in the city.

All the purchaser has to do to buy alcohol is to sign his name to a book at the drug store, by which he certifies that the alcohol is for "mechanical purposes." If the purchaser wants to drink the stuff it is none of the druggist's business. Minors are able to buy alcohol this way, too.

"Of course, we can prosecute the fellows who get drunk, and can send them to jail, but that doesn't injure the man who is selling the stuff," complained Mills.

Break Necks to Register

One of the greatest rushes in the history of Tacoma's registration office began today.

Tomorrow is the last day of registration before the two April elections, and hundreds of Tacoma men, who have been held at home because of the last month's bad weather, hurried to the city hall today to place themselves on the official books.

At noon the registration had reached 23,010. It is expected that 800 more will register before the offices close at 9 tonight.

Tomorrow the books will be open until midnight, and if there is still a line in waiting when the clock reaches 12, all those who are on hand will be allowed to register.

It is expected that 25,000 will have registered by midnight tomorrow.
