

MANY BOOZE CASES

County officials today completed their first move in a wholesale drive to clean out the city's illicit liquor trade.

Six arrests were made, including two women, a physician and three former saloonmen.

County Detectives Frew Shaw and Jacobs, accompanied by Deputy Prosecutor Thompson dashed in on the unsuspecting inmates of the Maple Leaf cafe, 1546 Broadway, and arrested Fred Reed and P. B. Millisack, proprietors, on a superior court warrant.

They are held on \$1,000 cash bail. Abatement proceedings have been started against the place as a public nuisance.

May Thompson, proprietor of a hotel at 409 South 21st st., was arrested for selling liquor illegally.

The Tumwater, at 1305 Pacific avenue, was entered and the proprietor placed under arrest on a John Doe warrant. The evidence against this place was that the "beer tea" served contained 17 per cent alcohol.

Stella Hays, proprietor of the Elma hotel, was arrested for selling liquor.

Dr. T. J. Pearsall, National Realty building, was arrested on a charge of issuing liquor prescriptions too freely. It is alleged he has issued more than 200 on a single drug store within the last few weeks.

RESOLUTION 6557 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA.

1. That the Council deems it necessary and expedient that the Charter of the city be amended by the repeal of Article XIV relating to Civil Service.

2. That it is the intention of the Council of the City of Tacoma to offer to the qualified electors of said city, at the general election to be held Tuesday, April 11th, 1916, the following amendment to the City Charter, to-wit: Amend said Charter by repealing Article XIV thereof, embracing Sections 179, 180, 181, 182, 183, 184 and 185, and relating to Civil Service.

3. That the Clerk be directed to publish this resolution as a notice in two daily newspapers, published and of general circulation in said city for thirty days immediately after the adoption of this resolution; and on Wednesday, March 8, 1916, or on such other day as the matter may be adjourned to, the Council will again vote upon said amendment.
