Threaten to Arrest Officials of T. R. & P.

Commissioner Mills today received instructions from the city council to arrest the T. R. & P. Co. officials if they persist in hauling freight cars through the downtown streets during business hours.

The action was taken after a delegation of truck company managers, who had complained last week about the street railway company's operations, made a second visit.

"You said you would force the T. R. & P. Co. to abide by the law," said Clarence Kellogg of the Western Truck Co. "But in the last five days 26 freight cars have been hauling up Pacific avenue in daytime. That's directly against the law. All that we ask is that the company live up to the law, just as we have to."

Mills told the council that he had written a letter to the street car company, but they hadn't

done anything yet." "Why don't you arrest the company if it violates the law?" demanded Fawcett.

The entire council informed Mills that it was up to him to see that the law was enforced, and he promised to make arrests of the street car company officials if they did not comply.

JAILED FOR DESERTING HIS BRIDE

Married nine days ago, deserting his wife the day after the wedding, and arrested a week later while keeping house with a former sweetheart, Frank Fosdick, conductor for the T. R. & P. Co., now will suffer six months' confinement in the county jail.

Fosdick was arraigned before Police Judge Evans today. Beside him stood Miss Lillie Wilson, a pretty Seattle girl, for whom he had deserted his bride the day after the wedding.

Plead Guilty. "Guilty," said each, as they were formally charged with having occupied the same apartment, in violation of law.

There was no trial. Judge Evans, who had performed the marriage ceremony for Fosdick and Miss Irene Tuel of Sumner nine days ago, was in no mood to listen to pleas for mercy.

"I sentence Fosdick to spend six months in the county jail," announced the court. "The girl will spend 60 days in the city jail."

Promised, Then Fleed. The bride is the daughter of a prominent family at Sumner. Her father, Clyde Tuel, is a well known rancher.

She married Fosdick recently to save him from a jail sentence, after she had caused his arrest for deserting her and being found in the company of the Seattle girl. Fosdick promised the court to "love, cherish and protect" his bride, and fled happily from court.

Next day Mrs. Tuel-Fosdick reported that her husband had returned to his former sweetheart.

Fire Sweeps Texas City

PARIS, Tex., March 22.—The fire which in six hours wiped out more than half of the city of Paris last night, was under control this morning.

The property damage is estimated at \$2,000,000. No loss of life has been reported.

The fire started in the warehouse of the Long Transportation Co. and quickly spread to the Paris Cotton compress. Frame buildings were quickly consumed owing to the fact that this section has been without rain for 50 days.

Firemen, hampered by a lack of water, were powerless to check the spread of the flames.

Thirty blocks of residences and business buildings lie in ruins today.
