





ALLIES INSULT GREECE

LONDON, April 17.—The allies may force Greece into the war against her will.

Overriding objections, the entente powers today are transporting Serbian troops overland from Corfu to Salonika. Germany protested that she would regard this as a deliberately unfriendly act, should Greece permit it.

King Constantine is reported to be incensed at the allies' action.

French correspondents at Athens stated that Constantine may attempt to use force to halt the movement of the Serbian troops. Danger from submarines caused the sending of troops overland.

Premier Skouloudis inquired the Teutonic position, and received the reply that Greece would commit an unneutral act if it should acquiesce in the proposal. Skouloudis stated the people might make a demonstration if the Serbians went through Greece. The allies, however, proceeded with their plans.

CHEHALIS, April 17.—The new Carlisle-Pennell Lumber Co.'s mill at Onalaska will be in operation before a week, according to an announcement last night by the owners.

20 GIRLS ESCAPE IN SCHOOL RIOT

SAN FRANCISCO, April 17.—Twenty girls, inmates of St. Catherine's home, a school for wayward girls, revolted last night and after breaking through the guard overpowered two policemen and escaped. All but eight were recaptured.

Bombard Warships

PARIS, April 17.—A French aviator dropped 16 bombs from an altitude of 100 yards on the decks of German warships in the North sea, it was announced today.

It is believed the missiles were effective. Aviators were active last night from Verdun eastward, despite a dense fog. They bombarded the railway stations at Conflans Pagnyn, Arneville and Rompach. German batteries shelled the French west of the Meuse.
