

## Poindexter With President; Jones, As Usual, Against

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 20.—Widely divergent views are held by Washington's senators on the president's message.

"I cannot understand why the president should take this course," said Senator Jones today.

"All he did was to call us together and tell us what he had done, not asking advice or assistance or submitting any proposition for our action."

Says Others As Bad.

"The people of this country will not approve anything that leads to war, because of the loss of life of citizens who insist on traveling on belligerent ships under the present conditions simply because they may have a doubtful constitutional right to do so."

Senator Poindexter takes a view more nearly in accord with the prevailing opinion of the senate.

"I agree entirely with the policy stated by the president in his message," said he today, "and I am very much in hopes that as president of the country he will take such action to maintain that position as will be worthy of a great country."

"Should he proceed in a dignified but vigorous and efficient way to back up the views he has expressed, he should have the cordial and general co-operation of the country regardless of politics. Had such steps been taken in such a manner as to admit of no doubt or equivocation one year ago, this issue would have been avoided. We cannot, however, recall the past, no matter how bitter may be our regrets."

"Of course, there is no possibility of fighting between this country and Germany under present circumstances or any that are likely to exist in the near future. Consequently, the issue is robbed of what otherwise might be of most profound and tragic interest."

Representatives Humphrey and Johnson had no comment to make.

Representative Dill, the one democrat from the state, while still trying to support the administration, leans to the views of Senator Jones.

"If we are going to break our diplomatic relations with Germany because of a disputed violation of international law, we ought to break off diplomatic relations with other nations who are persistently and continually violating our disputed international rights and would do exactly as she is doing and probably go much farther. Germany has made, to my mind, every possible concession to our demands and more than we had right to expect."

Agrees With Wilson.

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## French Capture Fortifications

PARIS, April 20.—The French captured the fortified positions northwest of Vaux last night, taking 200 prisoners and much booty, it was announced today. Other fighting in the Verdun region was unimportant.

French and German batteries maintained an incessant bombardment west of the Meuse. The French gained ground in mining operations at Argonne.

Gen. Joffre addressed the army in orders today, sending his best wishes transported to France for the purpose of fighting on the Occidental front.
