Tale of Dual Life As Strange As Fiction Is Expected In Waite Trial

Peck while they were his guests.

All Against Him.
With his wife turned against him and prosecuting her suit for divorce, and Margaret Horton, his "studio companion," fresh from the triumphs of a vaudeville engagement won as a result of the publicity she gained from her association with him, Waite faces his fight against the electric chair without the support either of the woman he married or the woman he squandered his money on.

Mrs. Horton will be asked to tell if she knows about a trip Dr. Waite is said to have made to Cornell medical school for cultures of the germs of several deadly diseases, at a time when he was not practicing his profession.

Mrs. Horton, whose husband has described her as an innocent dove among crows, was formerly a cabaret singer in Cincinnati.

She married Horton, went to New York and nursed an ambition to be a dramatic star.

Declares Her Innocence.
Mrs. Horton has given columns and columns of interviews, insisting that the "studio" she shared with Waite in the hotel was used only as a studio, that Waite never was anything more than friendly with her, and that they had to register under an assumed name, as man and wife, to get the suite.

Harry Horton, husband of The Woman of Mystery, at first declared that Margaret was so utterly innocent of the ways of the world and so incapable of any wrong that he felt her association with Waite was to be entirely condoned.

While he lay on a cot in Bellevue hospital, recovering from the effects of poisons he had taken in an attempt to die after the poisoning of his father-in-law was discovered, Waite told several stories of how it had happened.

"The Little Man."
Chief among these was the fable of "The Man From Egypt."

This mysterious and sinister spirit, Waite is said to have assured District Attorney Swann, was with him night and day, goading him on to evil deeds.

Nameless and intangible and possessed of the fiendish resourcefulness of ten thousand devils, The Man From Egypt never has been found. Nor is he expected to be.

Another story Judge Swann reported as having been told him by Waite was that his father-in-law was tired of living and asked him to get the arsenic for him so he could die.

Waite has made strange statements and his counsel may seek to prove he was insane.

One lonely little home in the south end of the city was brightened today when Judge Easterday explained to Emil and Amanda Anderson, man and wife, that he would gladly allow them to adopt the baby girl which Emil held awkwardly before the bench, provided they could assure the court that they loved the child.

This they did and the judge signed the papers which will make the home at 3223 South 14th street a paradise.

"There is nothing I would rather do than to give a homeless child a home and a childless home a child," the judge said. "The baby girl looks good to me and I am sure it will bring comfort to you."



Trimble Compliments Commissioner Pettit

The Rev. Delmer H. Trimble, pastor of the First M. E. church, yesterday paid the Pettit police administration a high compliment in one of his sermons. He said: "This city is fortunate in the election of Mr. Pettit as commissioner of public safety. Yet a blind man can see that the commissioner has some knotty problems to solve in these opening days of his administration."

"The police force is the broom with which he is to do his sweeping and evidently all the straws are not to his liking. The shake up in the department would indicate that Mr. Pettit is preparing his broom for execution. The good citizens of Tacoma recognize that the job is no easy one and will be disposed to be patient."

"The nullification of the prohibition law by unscrupulous druggists seems to have been seriously attempted in Seattle, but will, I believe, be averted in Tacoma in view of the character of the men in that profession. Their conference with the commissioner of public safety and the city attorney augurs well."

GRAND DUKE IMPERILS TURKISH LINE BY AN UNEXPECTED DRIVE TOWARD BAGDAD



A force of Russian cavalry under Grand Duke Nicholas, commander of the Russian army operating against the Turks on the Mesopotamia-Persian border, has formed a junction with the British forces, under Gen. Gorissage, after a bold ride, according to dispatches received today.
Nicholas sprung a coup on his adversaries by a sudden drive southwest of Lake Uhumliab.
The Turks were prepared for a continuation of his offensive further north, toward Erzerum.
The grand duke has crossed the Turkish frontier near Rowandiz, and is now only a short distance from the line of communications of the Turkish armies now blocking the advance of the British toward Bagdad.
The sudden appearance of the Russian cavalry with the British forces has raised the question whether the Russians have already cut the Bagdad railway at Mosul.

If they should cut or seriously threaten these lines, the Turks south of Bagdad would be cut off or compelled to retreat toward Ras el Ain, the present east terminus of the Bagdad railway leading to Constantinople.
