FRENCH REPULSE ATTACKS

PARIS, May 26.—The French repulsed violent attacks northwest of Verdun and made gains on the east bank of the Meuse, it was announced today.

They captured a trench near Thiaumont with a smashing grenade attack.

The Germans continued heavy fire east of the Meuse, especially around Deadman's Hill and Avocourt. Their infantry attacks were halted, however.

Heavy bombardment there this morning was believed to be preliminary to further assaults today.

The German gains on both banks of the Meuse have aroused the French to a sense of seriousness in the Verdun situation. No anxiety is felt, however.

Even if the Germans should capture Verdun, it wouldn't alarm Paris.

Pettit Will Ask Board to Alter Policy

At this afternoon's session of the social service board Commissioner Pettit will ask the board to cease its efforts at police work and specialize more on the original subject for which it was organized—youthful delinquency.

Since Pettit organized the board five years ago, the members have delved into police work, moving picture censorship and other subjects which were not intended for it.

"If the board can reform one single case of juvenile delinquency, it has done a remarkable thing," said Pettit today. "This class of work is something that the police cannot handle, but the social service board, composed of intelligent, able persons who are all mothers and fathers, can do an immense amount of good."

BUILDING THREE NEW JAP VESSELS

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 26.—The army bill, carrying \$150,000,000 has been agreed upon by the house military committee. The navy bill will probably be voted on next Monday.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 26.—Business members of the United States Chamber of Commerce, in a referendum to obtain an index of the preparedness issue, showed a strong recommendation for universal military training, an increased army and navy.
