SEATTLE CROWD GOES WILD OVER LOCAL BATTLER TEAM RETURNS SUNDAY FOR A TWO-WEEK STAY

Although boxing is barred in Tacoma, two Tacoma boxers last night proved to a crowd that packed the Elks' gymnasium in Seattle, that the City of Destiny can still turn out some clever scrappers.

Paul Steele, lightweight, and Earl Connors, bantam, put up two of the best battles seen in Seattle, according to ringsiders, in many a day. Both Tacomas had the Seattle fans rooting for them throughout their bouts.

With his inevitable grin showing through the smoke-fogged glare of the ring, Steele pounded determinedly at the champ's jaw and face. Bayley's effective covering up was the only thing that prevented Steele from using his deadly left uppercut. The crowd was on its feet during the entire bout and cheered wildly for Steele. The latter received only one hard blow during the four rounds, a straight jab to the right cheek-bone, but it never dazed him. The decision of a draw was well received.

The bout was clean and snappy. Bayley spoke highly of Steele's ability after the match. It was announced at the ringside that Steele would meet Traffy Davis, a promising Seattle boy, at Everett next Wednesday. Earl Connors and Joe Harrahan put up the most heady battle of the evening. Quick as a cat, Earl rushed in and out of the ring-center, jolting the Seattle boy with hooks and jabs at will.
