

Constable Mitchell, Justice Linck's henchman and a non-voting delegate to the republican convention, arrived in town today and confirmed the rumor that Hughes had been nominated. He went clear back to Chi on his vacation.

The constable reports the suffragets are a strong body when they go after anything en masse and says he thinks a lot more of their cause since they walked on him back there.

Mrs. Carrie Catt, he says, is some woman, both from a topographical and an intellectual viewpoint.

"Yes, sir, I sat in the same building with Hilles, Lodge, Root, Cannon and Sam Perkins," Mitchell said. He says Chicago is a nice town, but it rains a lot, according to his belief.

90 Days for Bootlegger

J. B. Pettirew, convicted recently in a justice court of bootlegging, pleaded guilty today just before he was to stand trial on appeal in the superior court and was sentenced to pay \$100 fine and serve 90 days in the county jail.

Pettirew was doing a rushing business, it is claimed, with the slurred juice until he met a state witness. He sold a pint of liquor to this witness for \$1.25 at the Palace hotel. He contracted for another pint the next day. Two officers met him instead of the witness and his business had a sad end.

French Hold

PARIS, June 12.—Repeated violent attacks west of Vaux have been completely repulsed, it is officially stated.

West of Soissons French artillery has destroyed the German works, one shell causing an explosion within the German lines, apparently striking an ammunition depot.

TEUTON ARMIES ROUTED

LONDON, June 12.—The Russian embassy today announced the complete rout of the Austrian armies near Czernowitz.

Two entire divisions with all generals, artillery and ammunition were captured. The Cossacks are overrunning the territory at the rear of the fleeing armies.

Russian troops are reported to have taken more than 100,000 prisoners since they began their great offensive.

In the fighting on the front of Volhynia and Galicia yesterday the Russians took 400 officers and 35,000 men, official statements say.

The tremendous offensive against the Austrians is being kept up from the wooded regions of Southwest Russia to the Rumanian frontier.

Lutsik has been captured and Dubno has been retaken. The retreating Austrians are being pressed westward, although putting up a stubborn resistance.

The present Russian offensive is being compared with the Russian drive against the Austrians at the beginning of the war.

CABINET SHAKEUP

ROME, June 12.—All Italian political parties are reported today to favor a national ministry containing Baron Sonnino, minister of foreign affairs and the present military ministers, following the resignation of the Italian cabinet headed by Premier Salandra.

The resignation of the cabinet was caused by the failure of the chamber of deputies to pass a vote of confidence in the government when the budget was presented.

Italians Gain

ROME, June 12.—The Italians today took the offensive all along the Tretino, making general advances. The movement is to develop into a powerful attack timed simultaneously with the Russian offensive, it is announced.

CANADIANS SUFFER ON ENGLISH FRONT

OTTAWA, June 12.—Dispatches carrying news of an engagement on the British front June 2 say the Canadian troops suffered more casualties than at any other time during the war.
