U. S. Cruisers Leave

SEATTLE, June 20.—It is expected the armored cruiser Maryland will be ordered to the Mexican coast. She left the Puget Sound navy yard today for California ports. The armored cruiser South Dakota, which was damaged recently, left the dry dock today and will probably leave for California tomorrow. Under orders to proceed to the west coast of Mexico under top speed, the cruiser San Diego, flagship of the Pacific fleet, with Admiral Winslow aboard, left San Diego at midnight for Mazatlan. The cruiser Chattanooga left late yesterday afternoon for Acapulco and the cruiser Denver left three hours later for Salina Cruz. The cruisers Colorado and Pittsburgh, the latter flagship of Rear Admiral Fullam, commander-in-chief of the Pacific fleet, sailed today. Including ships in Mexican waters, Admirals Winslow and Fullam will have a fleet of 17 cruisers, gunboats and destroyers.

Another Convention

CHICAGO, June 20.—The prohibition national committee has chosen Daniel A. Poling of Boston, acting president of the United Christian Endeavor Societies, as temporary chairman of the prohibition national convention at St. Paul. He will give the "keynote" address. Eugene N. Foss, former governor of Massachusetts; J. Frank Hanlay, former governor of Indiana; Henry Ford, William Sulzer, former governor of New York; Ira Landrith, president of the world's Y. M. C. A. convention, and Congressman Charles H. Randall of California are mentioned as possible presidential candidates on the dry ticket.

Crowds Hear Whiskers

MEXICO CITY, June 20.—To crowds which thronged the public squares of the capital, Carranza declared that "Mexico will not declare war on the United States, but will know how to do her duty if hostilities are forced upon her." He said that Mexico was not seeking war, but would not avoid it at the cost of national honor. More than 10,000 persons gathered at the great square in front of the municipal palace. They were addressed by War Minister Obregon and other members of the government. Crowds led by bands and banners marched through the streets.

Offers His Two Sons

The most disappointed boy at the armory yesterday was Forrest Monzingo, 13-year-old son of Dr. A. S. Monzingo, when he was refused enlistment in troop 8, because of his youth. His brother Herschel, age 18, was accepted, and was one of the first recruits to pass the physical examination and receive his enlistment papers. Dr. Monzingo appeared at the armory with his two boys and offered them for active service for Uncle Sam.

Ship Owners Waiting

The Ship Owners' Association of California has decided not to enter into any agreement with striking longshoremen until a compromise is reached. The Pacific Coast division of the International Longshoremen met in San Francisco and says the tension is lessening. Following the shooting of Thomas Olsen, union picket, at San Francisco, striking union men have entered a protest with collector of port against carrying of guns by non-union workmen and guards.

Chaplain a Recruiter

To recruit men to fill up vacancies in the ranks, Rev. Dr. S. S. Sulliger of Tacoma, chaplain of the state national guard regiment, left today for Bellingham. Sulliger has seen more than 13 years' service with the national guard. He has the commission of captain. He is superintendent of the Tacoma district of the Methodist church, and has made arrangements with Bishop Mathew Hughes to carry on his church work without hitch.

Big Allied Offensive

SALONIKI, June 20.—A general offensive in Macedonia is looked for here. French and British troops have been pouring into Saloniki for weeks. Estimate places the force assembled at 800,000 men. The allied offensive was postponed for a time on account of the outbreak of cholera in the Serbian army and the condition of the army after its retreat through Albania.
