DILLON BOXES MORAN TONIGHT

NEW YORK, June 29.—Once again we glimpse the fistie meeting of the "fair" big man and the "great" little man. This will be the morsel submitted for the approval of glove fans tonight, when Jack Dillon of Indianapolis, variously labeled the "Giant Killer" and the "Assassin" tangles with Frank Moran in a scheduled 10-round combat at the Brooklyn baseball park.

Two battlers of the slugging type are certain to clash in this engagement. Neither belongs in the scientific class. Dillon is far more aggressive than his blonde-tatched rival. He is faster and shifter because of his lighter poundage. Moran packs a heavy punch. So does Dillon. Both boast of pile-driving right-hand wallops. Neither has displayed an exceptional left mitt in the past. Dillon is a better fighter than Moran; undoubtedly the greatest ring warrior for his inches the white race has ever produced. But can he spot Moran 30 pounds

in weight, four in reach and five inches in height and still hope to win? Dillon says he can and points to his record studded with victories over gladiators as big and powerful as the Pittsburgher. If the latter wages the sort of fight against Dillon that he did against Champion Jess Willard he is almost certain to make things tough for Jack.

The best regulated boxing circles of Gotham Moran, by virtue of his superior weight, height and reach is hoped to stop the onslaught of the Giant Slayer. Both say they will win in a round or two. This sounds like the height of ridiculous prattle. The promoters have insured the affair against rain and are banking on a record gate.

Moran, who trained for Willard by shovelling snow and skating, is tuning up for Dillon by juddling a canoe and swimming in addition to his gym work. Jack's daily grind is devoted to the road and boxing.

LEGAL NOTICES.

INITIAL RESOLUTION 6595 FOR STREET LIGHTING IMPROVEMENT MET AND RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

That it is the intention of said council to order the local improvement hereinafter set forth, and to collect special assessments thereon, and to pay the cost and expense of such improvement, upon the real property which is hereinafter described, as follows:

That said improvement shall consist of the installation of a system of street lighting, with tungsten lamps and enclosing globes, upon metal standards, eight in number in each regular (long) block, and a proportionate number in shorter blocks, including two lamps at the intersection of each cross street; all to be arranged as shown on the Diagram of the Local Improvement District, together with the required transformers, wiring, underground cable, and all other apparatus required for the operation of the system.

That the improvement shall be installed on St. Helens Avenue, from the center line of Division Street to the center line of South 7th Street.

That the materials required for said improvement be advertised for and purchased under contract, and the work of installation be done by the regular city forces.

That the real property to be benefited by said improvement, and which will constitute Local Improvement District No. 5598 is described as follows:

All the lots in Blocks 7, 108, 207, 208, 407, 408, 607 and 608 as shown on Plat of New Tacoma, W. T. Norton Memorial Park.

All the above mentioned real property is situated in the City of Tacoma, Pierce County, Washington.

That the work of said improvement be done and said special assessments be levied and collected in the manner provided by Chapter 98 of the Acts of the Legislature of the State of Washington of 1911, and Ordinance No. 4611 of said City.

That all persons who may desire to object to the making of said improvement in the manner above set forth appear and present such objections at a meeting of said council to be held at the Council Chamber in the City Hall on Monday, the 17th day of July, 1916, at 10 o'clock A. M., or at the time to which the matter may be continued.

That the Commissioner of Light and Water submit to this Council at a date prior to said 17th day of July, 1916, the estimated cost of said improvement; a statement of the proportionate amount thereof which should be borne by the property within the proposed improvement district; a statement of the aggregate assessed value of the real estate, exclusive of improvements, within said district according to the valuation last placed upon it for the purpose of general taxation; together with a diagram or print showing thereon the lots, tracts and parcels of land and other property which will be specially benefited by said improvement and the estimated amount of the cost and expense of the improvement to be borne by each lot, tract or parcel of land or other property; and

That the City Clerk publish this resolution in two consecutive issues of the official newspaper as required by law.

That Resolution No. 6595, relating to this improvement, District adopted by the City Council, on the 24th day of May, 1916, be and the same hereby is, rescinded.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 332.—Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of Ordinance No. 3341 of the City of Tacoma, a roll has been placed in my hands for the collection of the 8th annual installment of the assessment levied for the improvement of South 15th Street from the present pavement on Pacific Avenue to west line of Commerce Street, South 21st Street from west line of Winthrop Avenue to west line of "C" Street; South 23rd Street and South 24th

Street from present pavement on Pacific Avenue to west line of "C" Street.

Said improvement consists in grading said portions of said streets to the established grade, with a roadway fifty-six (56) feet in width, and in laying down on said roadways a pavement of sandstone blocks with brick gutters, on a concrete base.

Said improvement consists also, in constructing granite curbs, concrete retaining walls and the necessary storm water drainage; also in extending all walks to the curb, taking up and relaying same where necessary; South 19th Street from Commerce Street to Jefferson Avenue, and South 21st and South 23rd Streets from "C" Street to Jefferson Avenue, shall be improved by the construction of storm water drains.

Provided that those parts to be paved by the N. P. Railway and the T. R. & P. Co. under their franchises shall not be included in this improvement.

Said installment may be paid on or before July 15th, 1916, but not paid on or before said date added interest, penalty and costs will attach.

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TACOMANS WIN MANY MATCHES

Spokane, June 29.—Mrs. T. B. Curran, women's champion of the Tacoma Country and Golf club, proved the sensation of the Northwest Golf tournament yesterday afternoon when she defeated Mrs. R. M. Wheeler of Butte, the best golfer in this part of the country, by two holes. It was the best match yet seen here.

LeRoy Pratt, jr., of Tacoma, was defeated by O. M. Potter of

Seattle on the 19th hole. H. B. Pringle of Tacoma, lost to J. B. Ingersoll of Spokane, 1 up. J. J. Dempsey of Tacoma, won from T. H. Golden, 4 up and 3 to play. L. H. Bean of Tacoma, defeated H. Thatcher, Bitter Root, 6 and 5. H. B. Hewitt of Tacoma, defeated G. Meade of Vancouver, 7 and 6. John Parker of Tacoma, defeated E. H. Strout of Seattle, 1 up.

REPORT PLOT TO CAPTURE DOCKS

Officials of the Oregon dock, owned by the Northern Pacific, declare that they intercepted a desperate attempt last night of striking longshoremen to mob its warehouse and take possession of it.

Report of the attempt was made to the police today. Twenty strike-breakers were brought by train from Seattle to augment the band of 50 working at the dock, and taken into the warehouse yesterday morning. The railroad company is allowing the non-union men to live in the warehouse, protected by police, where they are cooking their own meals, and sleeping on cots.

The twenty men worked all day. Towards late afternoon a timekeeper who formerly worked in Seattle, recognized 17 of the men as union strikers from that city. Later it was noticed that a large group of Tacoma strikers had gathered near the dock, and that three of the 17 had escaped from the dock and were in conference with the strikers.

Information was obtained that an attempt to capture the dock was being planned.

As speedily as possible, the remaining union men inside the dock, who had obtained their places through subterfuge, were paid off and ordered out of the warehouse. They immediately joined the Tacoma strikers and sauntered away, it is asserted.

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COUNCIL REFUSES TO CHANGE WIRING CODE

Practically all changes in the electric wiring inspection code, sought by electrical contractors of Tacoma for the purpose, it is alleged of "freezing out" small competitors, were refused by the city council today sitting as a committee of the whole.

Instead of refusing to allow home-owners and minor electricians from doing wiring, as the ordinance originally provided, the council decided to charge no permit fee, and to allow Tacomans to do their own wiring, so long as it is inspected by the city.

Inspection will be done by the light department, instead of building department. The license for electrical companies will be \$25 instead of \$50, and the bond \$500 instead of \$1,000.
