# SECOND REGIMENT JOINS OREGON BOYS

CALEXICO, Cal., July 8.—The entire Second regiment infantry, Washington National Guard, totaling 1,800 men, in addition to several auxiliary companies under command of Colonel W. M. Inglis of Seattle, encamped today alongside the camp of Oregon militiamen.

By moonlight last night, the Washington troops pitched camp, working from the time of their arrival early in the evening until the small hours of the morning. Troopers, under direction of their officers, went about their work of systematically setting up conical tents and stoves were unloaded and set up, and the work of preparing breakfast begun.

# Judge Must Settle Momentous Question

Whether Robert T. Harden, member of the strike committee of the longshoremen, touched his good right arm and said "we will," or whether he touched his good left arm and said "we can't," was the bone of contention in the hearing of the injunction case against the strikers in the federal court Saturday.

J. T. S. Lyle, the first witness, was the cause of the controversy, and it had to do with a conference the strikers and members of the Commercial club June 8.

Lyle was trying to show the strikers had made threats of violence. His version was that Harden pointed to his head and said "if we can't win with this (then pointing to his arm), we will win with this."

Harden's version of his own words were:

"If we can't win with this (his head) we can't win with this," (his arm).

Judge Cushman is expected before night to settle dispute and to rule whether the Sperry Mill Co. will get its restraining order against the strikers.

The defense began its testimony of Harden and of August Seitz, secretary of the local union, both of whom told of explicit orders to the strikers not to resort to violence, but to carry on the strike by peaceful picketing.

They said the men were ordered repeatedly not to carry arms.

SEATTLE COURT ENJOINS 'EM, TOO  
U. S. Judge Neterer has issued a temporary injunction in the Seattle court forbidding striking longshoremen from molesting the activities of the docks.

Regular police officers, who have been working 12-hour shifts returned to their regular 8-hour duties, and some of the special officers on the waterfront were dismissed.

"There is little likelihood of further trouble," said Commissioner Pettit today.

# KISSING AND DUST SPREAD EPIDEMIC

There seems little danger that Tacoma will be affected by the epidemic of infantile paralysis which is ravaging the east, said Dr. E. A. Rich, health commissioner, this morning.

"The epidemic form of the disease, which has been under observation for about 25 years, seems not to appear in the same city often than once in half a generation, or about 16 years," said Dr. Rich.

"Tacoma had her epidemic in 1910 or 1911, and should be immune for the present. There are one or two sporadic cases of a milder type in almost every city each summer, between July and October, but they are nothing to worry about."

"The term 'infantile paralysis' is a misnomer, as it affects all ages; but since it is a dust-borne disease, and children are nearer the ground than adults, they are more often attacked. 'The germ may be transmitted from mouth to mouth, or by the secretions of the nose and throat. If persons affected with the disease expectorate on the street, the organisms are blown about with the dust and the epidemic results."

"Symptoms are a tremendous headache and high fever, and the paralysis usually appears on the second or third day. This sometimes disappears entirely, and sometimes the patient remains paralyzed."

"The way to prevent infection is to keep youngsters from kissing each other, and keep them

out of the wind and dust."

**HEAT INCREASES FEAR**  
NEW YORK, July 8.—Six federal epidemic experts were on the ground here today fighting to stem the scourge of infantile paralysis.

A day of blazing heat—just the kind of weather in which the germ of the malady grows and spreads best—gave fear to officials here that the total cases would again mount.

# British Issue New Rulebook

LONDON, July 8.—A royal order changing the rules of blockade was issued today.

It stipulates that ships must prove that their destination is not a hostile nation. It permits the British to hold the ships until they show this proof.

Neutral ships carrying contraband to an enemy port are liable to capture on their next voyage.
