The new show, which opened Monday, is comedy from start to finish, and it is comedy with a capital "C."



Homer Dickinson and Grace Deagon have a clever singing and dancing act. Florence Rayfield is a dainty singing comedienne, and scored a big hit Monday.



## HUGHES MAKES MEXICAN POLICY HIS CHIEF TOPIC

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—The keynote speech of Charles Evans Hughes, delivered at the notification meeting last night, apparently pleased all republicans.

Both republicans and democrats are convinced from his utterances that his principal issue will be Wilson's Mexican policy. He also plans to attack inadequate preparedness and the tariff.

Comment of New York papers today is divided.

The Tribune says: "One clear note runs through the whole speech, a challenge of incapacity and an indictment of failure. It is rightly an indictment of Wilson's scattering viewpoint."

The Times says: "Little new matter appears in the speech. It will be remembered Hughes wishes to make the Mexican a burning issue so that hupenated citizens may show their patriotism."

"Calls It 'Confession'"

The World says: "Hughes' acceptance is a public confession of a candidate without an issue and without a policy. His policy, he says, is of firmness. But what form is this firmness to take, War? Intervention?"

Hughes attacked the record of the administration in regard to foreign relations.

"In numerous instances, notably in Latin America, where such a course was particularly reprehensible and where we desire to encourage the most friendly relations, men of long diplomatic experience whose knowledge and training were of especial value to the country were retired apparently for no other reason than to meet partisan demands by the appointment of inexperienced persons."

The trust of Santo Domingo, he said, was "shockingly betrayed," in order to satisfy "deserving democrats."

**Shockingly Unprepared**

"The conduct of the administration in Mexico has created difficulties we shall have to surmount. We shall have to adopt a new policy of firmness and consistency."

"We are shockingly unprepared. In view of the warnings of the last three years, it is inexcusable that we should find ourselves in this plight."

"Had this government left no doubt that when we said 'strict accountability' we meant exactly what we said, and that we should unhesitatingly vindicate that position, I am confident there would have been no destruction of American lives by the sinking of the Lusitania."

"When we contemplate industrial and commercial conditions we see that we are living in a fool's paradise. The temporary prosperity to which our opponents' point has been created by the abnormal conditions incident to the war."

"I endorse the declaration in the platform in favor of woman suffrage."

## HOLDS SUPREME COURT GREATER THAN CONGRESS

(This is the third in Manly's series of articles, breaking the silence of Silent Hughes. In these articles Manly, by quoting from speeches and supreme court decisions of Hughes lays bare the actuating principles by which the mind of Charles E. Hughes operates. EDITOR.)

Charles E. Hughes believes in the exaltation of the judicial over the legislative branch of government; in lawmaking by court decision; and in the "rule of reason" by which the supreme court decided a monopoly is all right if it doesn't go TOO FAR! (The court to decide what is "too far.")

This is shown by the fact that Hughes, as justice, concurred in the Standard Oil and American Tobacco decisions, against the protest of Justice Harlan.

These two great corporations, convicted by the courts, were dismissed with complete immunity; the supreme court deliberately reversed the position it had maintained for 20 years by declaring that only "unreasonable" restraints of trade were illegal.

The chief justice exalted himself above both congress and the president by an act of judicial interpretation, and literally placed upon his head the crown of supreme authority.

And W. J. Bryan has charged that Hughes presented this crown to the chief justice and urged him to wear it.

In the Commoner on Oct. 12, Bryan asserted: "In its 1908 platform the republican party promised to amend the Sherman anti-trust law. During the campaign of 1903 Gov. Hughes, of New York, interpreted that promise to mean that 'the Rule of Human Reason' must be accepted."

Later, Taft appointed Gov. Hughes, as well as other men of his mold of thought, to the United States supreme court.

"George W. Perkins, associated with J. P. Morgan in trust control, delivered a speech recently in which he complained that republican congressmen had not tried to redeem their platform promise, but that it had been redeemed by the supreme court in the recent trust decision wherein Gov. Hughes' 'rule of reason' was applied."

At McNeil's island, the guards say, he became so nerve-shattered over the blight of his career that it was necessary to put him in restraint. For a time his life was despaired.

Since leaving prison, the former official has had no regular employment, although friends have diligently attempted to locate a position for him.

Until recently he acted as special assistant to County Clerk McKanzie, drawing up a new jury list. This work was completed three weeks ago, and he has done nothing since.

Friends today planned to meet the train on which Mrs. Bridges will arrive late this afternoon, and break the news gently to her. Efforts to reach her by telegraph before she left Portland were ineffectual.

The widow is a member of a prominent Portland family. Her marriage to Bridges five years ago was a brilliant social event.

## ALLIES GIVE U. S. THEIR REASONS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 1.—The entente allies have given Ambassador Page their reasons for refusing permission to send Red Cross supplies into Germany and Austria. They suggest that if Americans wish to finance hospital units to supervise distribution, the permission might be granted; otherwise there would be no guarantee that the supplies would not be put to military use.
