TIGERS OUGHT TO BE PINCHED FOR STEALING

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 2.—Some of the fastest base running ever seen on the Vancouver diamond was introduced to Beaver fans Tuesday, when the Tacoma Tigers gave a correct imitation of a relay team trying to break records.

The Tacoma players stole 11 bags. Bigbee made four steals, including a double steal engineered with the assistance of Fries, Leard, Fries and Thompson each were credited with two stolen bases.

Peterson pitched his usual good game for six innings. In the seventh he blew up, and Sutherland was put in the box with two runs over, two on bases and one out. "Suds" held the Vancouver players runless during the remainder of the inning and allowed but one batter to reach first through the rest of the game.



Jap Net Stars Travel Over 10,000 Miles For U. S. Title



CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—Ichiya Kumagai and Hachishiro Mikami have arrived in these parts to make things tough for the headlines of American tennisdom.

In fact they are very much in our midst, having made their bows in the Missouri valley sectional doubles tournament on the Triple A courts, St. Louis, by winning the singles cup, the Central States doubles cup and two runners-up trophies.

Defeat at St. Louis deprives the Nipponese players of the chance to compete in the National doubles championship of the United States, a title which they traveled nearly 10,000 miles to strive for. Only winners of sectional tournaments are eligible to the National finals.

Kumagai holds the singles title of the far east, while the two divide the honors in the doubles supremacy of the same division.

Their most striking performance was the elimination of "Tubby" Griffin and Ward Dawson, in the final round of the far east tournament at Manila last month. Griffin last year was ranked fifth among Yankee stars and is a member of the well-known "Coast Tennis Trust."

The visitors are residents of Tokyo. Mikami is 28 years of age and a graduate of Waseda university, while his countryman is three years younger and only last season graduated from Keio university. These are Japan's two foremost institutions of learning and both schools have done a great deal to promote American sports in their land.

According to Mikami tennis was instituted in Japan 25 years ago, but only recently was taken up generally in the larger cities. Next year is expected to see Japan foster her first national championship tourney.

Mikami sports a wrist watch—a small gold ticker, worn on his left wrist. Kumagai wears spectacles sometimes on the courts and sometimes he doesn't.

TENNIS GAMES DEVELOP SPEED

Elimination matches of the Pacific Northwest tennis tournament developed some sensational play yesterday afternoon and evening.

Probably the cleverest game of the day was played between John Hunter of London and William Marcus, the California star. Hunter made a desperate effort to win, but finally lost the match after the last set had gone to a 14-12 score.

John Strachan of California, already a favorite for the title, won all his matches yesterday with ease. He defeated Camille Pessemier, a Tacoma star player, 6-0, 6-1, and won from Minot Davis, 6-3, 6-0.

Miss Irma Fraser, one of the most brilliant women players in Tacoma, and champion of the Tacoma club, won her way into the third round by defeating Miss Gertrude Schriener of Seattle, 6-3, 7-9, 6-2.
