MORE CHANGES TO BE MADE IN TIGER LINEUP

After winning every contest of a four-game series at Vancouver, the Tacoma Tigers will return to the home lot Sunday for a double header with Bob Brown's Beavers. The games start at 2 o'clock. It will be Vancouver's last appearance on the Tacoma field. Sutherland and Hartman will pitch for Tacoma.

Two games will be played at Vancouver this afternoon, marking the Beavers' last appearance on their own grounds. The first game is scheduled for 3 o'clock and the second for 6:15. All other games scheduled for Vancouver during the remainder of the season have been transferred to other cities.

Fans are becoming more interested daily in the Northwestern league race. Tacoma is fighting tooth and nail for second place, and is only one step behind Butte. Seattle has jumped from the cellar to fourth and is winning consistently. Spokane, leading the league all season, is losing more games than she wins, and dropping down to a point where the race begins to look interesting.

Al Hartman, who was released by Russ Hall Sunday and re-signed on Thursday, pitched a great game at Vancouver yesterday, allowing only three hits, two bases on balls, and hitting a three-bagger that brought in two of the Tigers' three runs. It was a genuine "come-back" and Al showed that he has the real stuff in him.

"Dutch" Melhaf has been released by Russ Hall. He has not shown much control with his "spitter" this season, although he is a good prospect for next year. Bankhead, who played with Butte, has been signed by Hall, according to Secretary Arno Redlich of the Tigers, and is waiting in Tacoma to join the team tomorrow. Peterson wrenched his shoulder a few days ago and has returned home. He may be unable to pitch during the rest of the season.

There is a possibility that Thompson, the Tigers' first sacker, will be used as a pitcher. Tommy has lots of speed and good control. If he is put into the pitching staff, Joe Connolly will play first, and Bankhead will be used in the field.

A split series with Seattle will be played next week, Tacoma playing at Seattle until Thursday, and returning home for the rest of the week.
