

100 Miners Contesting

Twenty-four teams, including in all nearly 100 men, are to take part in the annual mine rescue contest in the Stadium this afternoon. The program will include an explosion of coal dust in a tunnel to be erected on the grounds.

First aid contests will be held at 1:30 and 7 p. m., mine rescue contests at 3:30 and demonstrations at 7:45.

'Monk' Young In Jail

Caught in the act, the police say, of filling flasks with nine gallons of whisky, Arthur ("Mont") Young, of Gillies case fame, is in the city jail Saturday charged with having liquor in his possession with intent to sell it. The whisky had been stored in a shed on Sprague street, it is said.

The police claim to have been tipped off that Young had a cache, and have been keeping tab on him for several days. They say that when detectives entered the shed he was doing a fine job with the funnel.

Young formerly conducted the Locus saloon. He cashed some of the forged checks by which Gillies looted the industrial insurance fund.

Elks Have Lively Time

HOQUIAM, Aug. 19.—Competition is strong for the next annual convention of the Elks who are visitors here 3,000 strong. The Tacoma, Vancouver, Wenatchee and Yakima lodges have appeared as contestants for the 1917 meeting, with Yakima and Wenatchee as favorites.

The day, which closed with a pavement dance last night, was a busy one. The parade was said to be the largest ever held by the association, with Seattle taking the honors. More than 2,000 Elks were in line. Sports were staged on the Hoquiam river in the afternoon.

OLYMPIA, Aug. 19.—Praising the deeds of early pioneers who endured hardships for the benefit of later generations, Mrs. William Cumming Story, national president of the D. A. R., urged unity in the movement for preparedness and defense of the nation at the unveiling of the marker at the end of the old Oregon trail at Tumwater.

The ceremonies were attended by 600 persons. The monument is made of concrete and bears a copper plate on which are the inscriptions of the D. A. R. and the S. A. R.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 19.—Here's the way Charles E. Hughes, with one sweep of oratory, explained his ignoring of Gov. Johnson and disposed of the break between the progressives and republicans in California, in his speech here:

"I come here as spokesman of the national republican party. With local differences I have no concern. The great national aims I have in view transcend all possible local differences and we are together, reunited, inspired by the loftiest traditions of our historic party and devoted to the accomplishments of their great achievements upon which must rest our enduring prosperity as a nation."

Shipping Bill Passes

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—Senator Jones of Washington voted "No" to the administration shipping bill when it passed the senate late yesterday by a vote of 38 to 21.

The bill created a shipping board and appropriates \$50,000,000 for its use in the purchase or operation of ships by the government. It had already passed the house in a slightly different form.

An attempt of Senator Borah to attach the immigration bill to the shipping measure failed.
