NEW ARREST IN NICHOLS DEATH CASE

(United Press Leased Wire) IRONWOOD, Mich., Sept. 13.—Detectives left here today for New York with Arthur Waltonen, alias John Lind, barber, who has been employed here for several months and who is alleged by police to have confessed to the murder of Mrs. Elizabeth Nichols, a wealthy New York widow, who was strangled to death in her home in New York and robbed of jewelry to the value of \$28,000 about a year ago.
A servant in the Nichols' household had been sentenced to be electrocuted for the crime.

(United Press Leased Wire) NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Following the arrest at Ironwood, Mich., of Arthur Waltonen, who the police say has confessed to the murder of Mrs. Elizabeth Nichols, more than a year ago, local authorities early today arrested a man whose name has not been revealed and who they say also is implicated in the crime.

LINDSEY WINS OUT AGAIN IN COLORADO

(United Press Leased Wire) DENVER, Colo., Sept. 13.—Latest today indicate that Gov. George B. Carlson has been re-nominated as republican candidate to head the state ticket by a very small plurality over Samuel D. Nicholson.
Congressmen Hilliard, Keating and Taylor were re-nominated by the democrats in the First, Third and Fourth districts. The Second district is still in doubt.
The republicans nominated Henry B. Teller in the First, re-nominated Congressman Timberlake in the Second; named Henry J. E. Baird in the Fourth with the Third district yet to be heard from.
Judge Ben B. Lindsey was named to succeed himself as judge of the juvenile courts.

COUNCIL PLANNING 'GRAND DEFENSIVE'

(United Press Leased Wire) BERLIN, Sept. 13.—The combined "grand offensive" of the allies will be met by a combined "grand defensive" of the central powers, who will swing to the attack when the proper time comes.
The great war council being held at the kaiser's headquarters on the eastern front is for the purpose of unifying the direction of all military movements by armies of the central powers.

HOLD FIVE YOUTHS ON SERIOUS CHARGE

Five youths of Tacoma were arrested by Detectives Milone and Osborne Tuesday evening and are being held at the city jail on suspicion that they are responsible for the long series of automobile thefts that have kept the police busy all summer.
The boys give the names of Joe Garvey, Carl Adler, Joe Mauritz, Hilding Peterson and Ed Hermanson.

GREECE WILL FORM PRO-ALLY CABINET

(United Press Leased Wire) LONDON, Sept. 13.—King Constantine has accepted the resignation of Premier Zalmis and the formation of a new pro-ally cabinet is under way, said dispatches from Athens today.
A. Sifanos, a former member of the Venizelos cabinet, has been instructed to sound M. Dimitrakopoulos relative to the formation of a new ministry.

125 CITIES VOICE PLEA FOR PLANT

(United Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 13.—The tales of 125 cities were poured into the willing ears of the naval board charged with the job of picking a site for the government's \$11,000,000 armor plate plant today.
Later they will read a great stack of briefs, brought or sent from various cities.

AUSTRIANS GETTING OUT OF VALLEYS

(United Press Leased Wire) BUCHAREST, Sept. 13.—The Austrians are retreating from the upper Maros and Alta valleys in Transylvania without attempting any serious resistance, it was officially announced today.
The capture of Orsova by the Rumanians has stopped the progress of Austrian and Bulgarian supply ships on the Danube.


G. O. P. MAINE LEAD SLIGHTLY LARGER

FRENCH CAPTURE VILLAGE

(United Press Leased Wire) PARIS, Sept. 13.—Continuing their great drive on the front of Comblès and Peronne, the French last night captured the whole of the village of Bouchavesnes, midway between Comblès and Peronne, and despite the Germans' most desperate resistance, it was announced today.
Early this morning the French pushed further eastward, capturing the Bois Labe farms near the Peronne-Bapaume-Bethune highway, by a brilliant bayonet charge.
The French gains are of the greatest importance.
The positions carried are the last of the strongly fortified German third line.
All the positions now held by the Germans back of this line have been built under the unceasing fire of French artillery and consequently are not nearly so strong as the old lines.
The capture of both Comblès and Peronne within a fortnight is expected by some military critics if Gen. Foch continues his hammer blows north of the Somme.

TROOP B TO STAY IN SOUTH 60 DAYS

(United Press Leased Wire) CALEXICO, Cal., Sept. 13.—Advices from the war department indicate Troop B will remain here at least 60 days longer. Quarters have been made comfortable with shower baths, wash rooms and other conveniences. The troopers are being thoroughly exercised in mounted drill, long marches being taken on the road.

OREGONIANS GET A FLOATING SALOON

(United Press Leased Wire) EUREKA, Cal., Sept. 13.—The power schooner Tramp, equipped as a floating saloon, Capt. Bob Jones, expects to start immediately for the Columbia river bar, and anchor outside the three-mile limit, to sell drinks to the thirsty from Oregon.

BITTER FIGHT AT POLLS IN ILLINOIS

(United Press Leased Wire) CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—The most bitter political campaign Illinois has experienced in years has today gone to the court of last resort—the voters.
One of the tightest races ever started for a republican governorship was till in progress as voters went to the polls to select one of three candidates to run in the November elections—Col. Frank O. Lowden, Frank L. Smith or Morton Hull.
On the democratic side, the race is just as hot. Sullivan democrats have lined up against Gov. Dunne, opposed for the nomination by William Brinton.

VALLEYITES BOUND TO LOSE ANYWAY

If it rains this week, the Western Washington Fair at Puyallup will lose money. If it doesn't, the blackberry crop probably will be ruined by frost, and the Puyallup & Sumner Fruit Growers association will lose money. W. H. Paulhamus, being head of both, doesn't know what to pray for.

Hughes Confers With Old Guard Members

(United Press Leased Wire) NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Elated at the result of the Maine election and highly pleased with his record breaking campaign trip, Charles Evans Hughes, republican presidential nominee, returned to New York early today.
Hughes and Mrs. Hughes were driven direct to the Astor hotel, where they had breakfast, and the candidate then took up the task of a series of conferences with republican leaders.

Senator Smoot of Utah, Murray Crane, Frank Hitchcock and others were waiting for a word with him.
It is planned for him on his second campaign trip beginning Monday, to hit the high spots in Indiana, Illinois, Ohio and Wisconsin, returning to New York by Sept. 29 when he will deliver the keynote address of the New York state campaign.

FRANK PROSECUTOR WINS NOMINATION

(United Press Leased Wire) ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 13.—Hugh M. Dorsey, Atlanta, prosecutor of Leo M. Frank, apparently swept the state in the democratic primaries for the gubernatorial nomination. Estimates from 108 counties out of 153 give Dorsey 35,000 and Gov. Harris 22,000.
