\$2,000,000 SHIP TOTAL LOSS

These sailors fought the flames to the last. When nothing could be done they tumbled into lifeboats as they were, many wearing only canvas pants and streaked from head to foot with soot and grease.

One officer was overcome by smoke. There were several others injured.

A number of passengers rushed on deck in their underwear. Stewards supplied them with blankets and shawls. No sooner had the palliant crew gotten the passengers on the Michie than they began making coffee.

Darkness was falling and the gloom brought out bursts of hysterics. As the dredge started for shore fire began shooting up from the doomed liner, which broke from its moorings and drifted.

Mrs. Margaret Reig of St. Louis was ill in bed when the order came to abandon ship. Fellow passengers carried her to a boat, and she was landed safely.

Not so much as a foot-wetting was experienced by any seaman or passenger during the fire, with one exception. The ship's baker, one of the crew, was overcome by the smoke. He was found immediately, and taken to the hospital.

Five thousand barrels of oil in the Congress fuel tanks were blazing today, vomiting a huge pillar of lily smoke skyward.

The Congress was the biggest of the Pacific Coast Steamship Co.'s fleet and the largest American coastwise vessel.

Steamship Councillor Torpedoed

(United Press Leased Wire) LONDON, Sept. 15.—Frank Callingham of New York, a fireman aboard the Harriston liner Councillor, made an affidavit before the United States consul at Queenstown that the Councillor was torpedoed.

The captain and crew of the Councillor were landed at Queenstown.

Callingham, who is an American citizen, shipped aboard the vessel when she touched at San Francisco.

His wife is now at Atlantic City, N. J.

SUNK IS REPORT

A London dispatch last night said the Councillor was "sunk" and that her crew was saved, but nothing was reported about the circumstances of the sinking.

The Councillor was last reported as having sailed from Colon, Panama, August 27 on route for Liverpool.

SPECIAL TRAIN TO TAKE PASSENGERS OF BURNED LINER

(United Press Leased Wire) EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 15.—A special train to carry passengers from the burned liner Congress left here at 7:30 today for Marshfield.

It is due to arrive there about 12:30 p. m.

Southern Pacific officials said that the passengers would not reach Portland before tomorrow morning.

A second special is being made up for the crew.

CAN'T TESTIFY TO BILLINGS' RECORD

(United Press Leased Wire.) SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—Some of the principal witnesses for the prosecution are not expected to testify in the trial of Warren K. Billings, preparedness day bomb suspect, for the purpose of showing by Billings' past record a conspiracy and a familiarity with bombs and their explosion. The prosecution did not lose this point without a fight.

SERBS CHASE FOR BACK TEN MILES

(By United Press Leased Wire) PARIS, Sept. 15.—Allied troops have scored the greatest victories against the Germans and Bulgarians since the Balkan offensive began, it was officially announced today.

The Serbs drove the Bulgarians back 10 miles in a hasty retreat on the allied left wing capturing Garnitchevo by a brilliant bayonet charge and the major part of the crest of Markanidje.

ALL FOUR JUDGES MAY BE UNOPPOSED

If it is found that not more than 20,000 votes were cast in the non-partisan judiciary primaries, as estimated by election officials, names of all four of the present superior court judges will go on the ballot in the November election unopposed.

Judge Card, Clifford, Easterday and Chapman each polled more than 50 per cent of that total, and if the estimates are correct their election is assured.

Returns from all of the 217 county precincts show that Judge Card led the field with 13,123; Chapman was second with 11,454; Easterday third with 11,244; and

Clifford fourth with 10,251.

The result of the contest between Commissioner Williams and J. R. O'Farrell probably will not be definitely decided until an official count is made. Unofficial figures show Williams four votes in the lead: William, 3,310; O'Farrell, 3,306.

The official count was begun by the county auditor Friday afternoon. As the Williams-O'Farrell campaign has been bitterly fought, it is expected a recount will be asked.

The race between T. H. Bellingham and John L. Murray for commissioner from the Second district, is also neck-and-neck. Unofficial returns give Bellingham 2,140; Murray 2,032.

Final unofficial returns show no further upsets in the county ticket, as announced Thursday.

The work of officially canvassing the vote will begin next Monday.

Voters who failed to register before the primaries now have until Oct. 17 to get their names on the registration books if they want to vote in the election Nov. 1.
