'Old Guard Blackmail'

(Special To The Times.)
NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Coinciding with the announcement in the Philadelphia Inquirer, organ of the republican old guard in Pennsylvania, that Senator Penrose would assume full control of the Hughes campaign in that state, comes the public charges by the Philadelphia North American, progressive but supporting Hughes half-heartedly, that the republican machine in Philadelphia is engaged in raising the biggest campaign fund "ever forced from city employees."

In Monday's issue, emphasizing the assessment upon laborers, scrub-women, stenographers and clerks, the North American characterizes the work of the republican machine as "city payroll blackmail."

The Philadelphia Public Ledger, which is supporting Mr. Hughes, also condemns the present practices of the old guard machine.

Urge Strike In East

(United Press Lensed Wire)
SEATTLE, Sept. 19.—Gordon J. Kelly, international vice president of the union longshoremen, left here for Buffalo today to urge a sympathetic strike of Atlantic coast waterfront workers. Kelly will recommend only that the union longshoremen on the Atlantic refuse to work ships that have been loaded on the Pacific coast of the United States.

This action follows a conference here of delegates from every Puget Sound port to decide whether the strike here should be called off, or sympathetic co-operation asked of the eastern unions.

War Cars Once Plows

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 19.—The now famous British "tanks," the armored motor-cars which have surprised the world by hurdling German trenches, walking through forests and crawling over shell craters in the face of heavy gun fire, were built, most of them, in Peoria, Ill., it developed today. They were built in the form of caterpillar tractors, designed many years before the war to meet some of the hard problems of modern farming. Minus the armor and machine guns, thousands of them are in use in the U. S. for plowing and digging.

Boys Can't Stay Away

The call of the circus was too much for Albert Sanders, age 12, and Roy Van Deventer, age 9, who were missing from their Tacoma homes for three days. Their adventures came to an abrupt end Monday when the call of the calico and wild beasts got the better of them. They were hauled home to tubs of hot water and soap.

Tacoma's Perfect Baby Eats Four Meals a Day, Digs in the Dirt, Goes to Bed Early, and Wrestles With Pup

Sylvia Kane, Tacoma's latest 100 per cent baby, stands 32 inches in her pink, bare feet. The circumference of her head is 19 inches, and of her chest exactly the same.

The diameter of her chest from front to back is 5 inches, and the diameter from side to side 6 1/4 inches.

The circumference of her abdomen is 18 inches, length of arm 13 1/4 inches, and length of leg 14 1/4 inches.

She weighs 25.8 pounds and is 20 months old.

She has melting, dark eyes, a mop of curly, golden hair, and distracting dimples.

She lives, with her father and mother, Dr. and Mrs. J. P. Kane, and four brothers and sisters, at 8002 Park avenue.

On Sylvia's leap into fame, as the only "perfect baby" found in two years' search by the examining doctors at the Western Washington fair, she was at once sought by a reporter and urged to give a set of "health and beauty hints" to the public, as other famous beauties do.

Here is her recipe for becoming a perfect baby. It was given by her father, but Sylvia trotted up and down the room all the time, smiling her approval, and illustrating with every motion, the results which can be obtained by following directions exactly.

Sylvia was breast-fed until she was nine months old. She now has four meals a day, of milk, eggs and a carefully varied diet, including oatmeal, thoroughly cooked the day before.

She plays outdoors all day long, digging in the dirt, wrestling with the puppy, tagging after her older brothers and sisters, and absorbing all that her sturdy little chest will hold of good, fresh air.

She dresses warmly in the winter and lightly in the summer; sleeps from six in the evening until six in the morning, and has a nap during the day, and never, never, never sits up late or accompanies her mamma to card parties or other functions.
