SEATTLE COUNCIL MAY ACT

SEATTLE, Sept. 21.—Negotiations for settlement of the longshoremen's strike halting met with failure here, a request made by the Riggers' and Stevedores' union last night for a sympathetic strike of all transportation workers in Seattle was in the hands today of the strike and grievance committee of the Central Labor Council.

Following the refusal of the council to act immediately on the request, Martin Meyer, president of the local longshoremen's union, resigned as a delegate to the council.

The committee in whose hands the request was placed was instructed by the council to make a thorough investigation of the situation on the waterfront.

Federal Conciliation Commissioner William Blackman, who was sent here from Washington in the interests of arbitration, admits that efforts to end the strike have proved futile.

M. C. TEBBETTS FREED BY JURY

M. C. Tebbetts, president of M. C. Tebbetts, Inc., stands acquitted of the charge of setting fire to the company's store at 12th and A streets, after a trial lasting two days.

The jury brought in a verdict of "not guilty" at 10 o'clock Wednesday night after nearly five hours' deliberation. None of the jurors would discuss the verdict.

The state's case was based entirely on circumstantial evidence to show that Tebbetts was the only man in the store in the evening shortly before the fire was discovered.

The fact that the fire was of incendiary origin was undisputed. But Tebbetts produced corroborative evidence to prove he had left the store nearly two hours before the fire was discovered.

War Five Years More?

(Newspaper Enterprise Association.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 31.—Basing his prediction on information given him by military experts who have been in the war zone, Col. Robert M. Thompson, president of the Navy League of the United States, says the European war will last five years.

"The defeat of the Germans seems inevitable," said Thompson, "but it will take two years of fighting to drive them out of France and Belgium. Within her own borders Germany will put up a bitter fight and it will take at least three years to conquer her after she is driven back to those borders."

Troops to Give Drill

ROY, Wn., Sept. 21.—Col. Inglis has promised to send a body of 2d regiment troops from the American lake camp to give an exhibition drill at the sixth annual Roy fair which opened Thursday and will end Saturday.

The Western state hospital at Stellacoom will have a fine exhibit of vegetables. The livestock exhibit will be larger than ever before. Friday will be Governor's day, and Gov. Lister will make an address in the afternoon.

Saturday's big feature will be a ball game between the old rivals, McKenna and Roy.

French Gain at Verdun

PARIS, Sept. 21.—French troops made two successful attacks on the German lines northeast of Verdun last night, capturing two trenches and 100 prisoners south of Thiaumont and advancing 100 yards in Vaux Chapitre wood, it was officially announced today.

LONGSHOREMEN CLAIM WATERFRONT VICTORY

Refusal of the captain of the barkentine Mary Winkleman, loading lumber at the Danaher mill, to continue to hire a crew of non-union lumber-handlers, is causing much enthusiasm among striking longshoremen Thursday.

They believe it is another victory in their stubborn fight against the open shop.

"The barkentine began loading several days ago through the Puget Sound Stevedoring Co., an open shop longshoremen concern," declared W. T. Morris, an officer of the lumber-handlers' union Thursday.

"In three days the non-union men loaded less than 100,000 feet of lumber. Union men would have stowed at least 270,000 feet in the same time.

"Wednesday morning the captain of the ship discharged the entire crew, because he said that they were stowing the cargo in a dangerous manner, and he was afraid to take his ship to sea with such a load."

The skipper of the Winkleman is said to be favorable to the union cause, but because his employers are unfair to union labor in certain other ports, the Tacoma union longshoremen cannot handle cargo for the ship.

WANT SOMEONE TO SUB FOR DESTINN

KEEP NAMES OF VICTIMS SECRET

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—Many prominent Chicago men and women are breathing easier today than they have for some weeks following the confiscation of a card index case used by the blackmailers, some of whom are supposed to be under arrest here.

"At least 20 names were listed and opposite each one was some note of misconduct which the syndicate hoped to use for extortion," said a detective here today who worked on the case.

"All those listed were of prominence financially and socially here. But the names will not be given out," he said.

Evidence of the syndicate's operations continues to pile up here. A wealthy machinery manufacturer is known to have become infatuated with a woman in a cafe. As the romance waned, the woman told him she was ill and suggested he send her to the mountains and give her \$100,000.

If you do not see the justice of this, perhaps your wife will," she wrote him in answer to his objections.

He had the woman shadowed in New York and forced her to sign a statement that she had lied and absolving him from further payments.

Another woman hired out as a stenographer and after several rounds of cafes and road houses with her employer, demanded \$25,000.
