May Order Lewis Gun

 WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 26.—Stirred by the expose of the conduct of our lame U. S. ordnance board, as this resulted in the turn-down of the Lewis machine gun which has proved of great value in the European war, Secretary of War Newton D. Baker is likely to order the entire matter reopened.

Regardless of whether they are upholders of the Lewis machine gun, army officers are of the opinion Baker will reopen the case and either order the gun adopted entirely or order that both types be bought and used—one for offensive work and one for defensive work.

Kids Raise Fine Pigs

 WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Twenty thousand pure-bred pigs raised by 20,000 youngsters on 20,000 farms.

That is the 1916 outcome of the department of agriculture's "pig club" experiment.

The club members are required to secure a pig, feed and care for it according to instructions, keep records of the amount of feed consumed, the gains in weight, cost of the grain per pound, breeding records, etc.

At the end of the year the members are required to send reports to the state pig-club agent, and wherever possible the pig club member must show his or her pig at the county fair.

1308 at Night School

Work has started in the Tacoma night school with 1,308 students enrolled in the Stadium and Lincoln Park high schools. Home economics and general high school work drew the largest enrollment. The enrollment at Stadium was 155 short of the opening night last year, probably because there are fewer men out of employment, but is expected to be normal by next week.

Because of the great demand for machine shop work at Lincoln school, Tuesday and Thursday night classes may have to be arranged. The gymnasium classes are proving popular.

Bread'll Be Raised

 CHICAGO, Sept. 26.—Bread prices throughout the country will be raised within a month, it was predicted here today, following indications that the federal government would not attempt to halt the increase in Chicago.

In view of the high cost of materials, it was announced yesterday prosecution would be difficult. District Attorney Kline is expected to construe the decision of a meeting of the bakers last night as an "understanding" rather than as an "agreement."

60 Go to New School

The new school building at Firwood, on the Puyallup Short Line, is occupied for the first time this year.

The total enrollment at Firwood is only 60 children, yet the course is as complete as in the larger schools in the valley. The directors of the district are A. J. Gale, Silas Kross and Mrs. Friday. The school building cost \$12,000.

Jews Begin New Year

Sundown Wednesday will mark the beginning of the celebration of Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year. The day is also called Yom Hazikaron, Day of Memorial. One of the features of the ritual to be observed in the Temple Beth Israel will be the blowing of the "shofar" or ram's horn.

Ten days of penitence will follow the feast day Thursday, reaching their climax on the Day of Atonement, Yom Kippur, Oct. 7. All this ushers in the Jewish year 5677.

GERARD IS TO DEMAND HELD BACK MORE CARS

 BERLIN, Sept. 26.—Ambassador Gerard, who was to leave for Copenhagen today to take passage for the United States, may change his plans at the last moment.

Several members of the German ministry called at the embassy last night. Their visits followed a call by Foreign Secretary von Jagow in the forenoon and Gerard's conference with Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg on Saturday.

Mrs. Gerard, who has entirely recovered from the shock she suffered in an automobile accident yesterday, will accompany her husband. Gerard told reporters that he certainly expects to return to Berlin even though he should decide to go to the United States.

NEW CRISIS IN GREECE

(United Press Leased Wire.)
 ATHENS, Sept. 26.—Ex-Prime Minister Venizelos' sudden departure for the island of Crete held by the revolutionists has created a new crisis in the Greek capital.

King Constantine motored to Athens to consult the prime minister as soon as he learned the news. A few hours later it was announced that General Moschopoulos, chief of the general staff, had resigned.

Venizelos will issue a proclamation calling for the mobilization of all Greek soldiers upon his arrival at the island, according to his advisors here.

He may take no further step before visiting Salonika and possibly London, though it is rumored in some sources that he will lead a revolution at once.

Venizelos plans to visit all the Greek islands where revolutionary organizations have been formed.

TITLES WILL NOT SHOW ON BALLOTS


