### AIRMAN IS PICKED UP

(United Press Leased Wire.) BOSTON, Oct. 3.—After drifting all night in his hydro-teroplane off Nantucket, where he had been forced to descend through lack of gasoline, Lawrence Sperry, aviator and inventor, was picked up today.

Sperry was none the worse for his night on the water. He was not accompanied by Capt. Leo Dewey as had at first been reported. Sperry had been somewhere in the air or at sea off the Massachusetts coast.

Searchers started a hunt for him following his efforts last night to fly from Lynn to Marblehead in a hydro-teroplane. Fear was felt that he had been blown out to sea.

The war department dispatched a tug to scour the harbor, while friends also furnished boats to assist.

This was sperry's second attempt to reach the yards at Marblehead.

### ASKING \$109,000 FOR BRIDGE WORK

J. M. Hayes, county bridge and wharf inspector, submitted a statement to the county commissioners Tuesday showing the amount of work on new bridges, rebuilt bridges, wharf repair and road work he says will have to be done in 1917. The total money needed for the work is \$109,000, his report shows.

It includes a proposed steel bridge at McKenna, a draw span on Lincoln avenue, a bridge on the Wikeson-Carbonado road, a span and approach at McMillan, a 600-foot pile bridge at the head of Gig harbor, a bridge on the 64th street extension road.

### Where Allies May Try to Imprison Kaiser William

St. Helena, the forbidding prison islet, 1,200 miles out in the Atlantic ocean from the coast of Africa, is a crown colony of Great Britain, with a population of less than 4,000 and a garrison of 500. Its 47 square miles of area are composed chiefly of grim volcanic cliffs and peaks. It is a British naval coaling station, 300 miles from the nearest land, but has a cable connection with Europe.

### LIKES OUR PEACE IDEA

(United Press Leased Wire.) LONDON, Oct. 3.—Lord Bryce, former ambassador to the U. S., today advocated an international alliance to preserve peace in an article in the Manchester Guardian.

"Several English leaders," Lord Bryce said, "look with favor on the plans of the American League to Enforce Peace headed by Ex-President Taft, but have remained silent while England is engaged in a great war."

He cited President Wilson's speech before the league on May 21, and Charles E. Hughes' reference to such an alliance in his speech of acceptance.

### Charge Rancher Living in Poverty is Wealthy

Has Pierce county another Alder? Is his little shack at the edge of the woods one mile from Alder a veritable storehouse of hoarded gold?

These were the mysteries to be solved when Lorenz appeared in Justice Linck's court Tuesday afternoon to answer a charge of refusing to supply food and clothing and shelter for his three young daughters.

Three years ago, county officers claim, Lorenz sold timber on his Alder ranch and reaped a profit of \$5,000. There is no evidence that he has spent a cent of it.

Yet when the county juvenile officer went after him, charging he was letting his daughters starve in rags and poverty, he declared he had not a cent to supply them with food or clothing.

When arrested and asked if he could put up bond, he said he had no money.

Yet when Constable Mitchell brought him to the county jail in Tacoma and he faced the iron bars for the first time, he forked out of his pocket a roll of bills which Mitchell said beat most anything he had ever seen.

The roll appeared to consist of currency of ancient vintage, says Mitchell.

### JAPAN CABINET QUILTS IN BODY

(United Press Leased Wire.) TOKIO, Oct. 3.—The cabinet headed by Premier Okuma resigned today.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 3.—Persistent opposition of the Japanese upper (non-elective) house of parliament to the policies of Premier Okuma is responsible for his resignation, news of which was cabled from Tokio today. This is the belief of the embassy here.

Okuma's party controlled the majority of the lower house, but a coalition of other parties in the upper house was formed against him.

It is understood the premier has been contemplating resigning for some months and has been waiting for a time when he thought he could arrange a successor from his own party.

Marquis Okuma offered his resignation more than a year ago along with the resignation of the other members of his cabinet which was then of his own organization.

The emperor had accepted the resignation of Home Minister Okura, whose withdrawal resulted from charges of bribery, and the premier and others immediately offered to step down.

(United Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Oct. 3.—Ambassador Sato, who arrived here from Japan early yesterday en route to his new post at Washington, D. C., expressed surprise today when United Press dispatches telling of the resignation of the Okuma cabinet, were read to him.

"I had heard nothing of it and am as much in the dark as you are as to reasons for the reported resignations," he said. "There was no intimation that the Okuma cabinet anticipated such a step when I left Japan."
