

MOTHERS GET THE CREDIT

"The health of the men in the 2nd Washington regiment at the border was better than the health of the same number of men at home under average conditions," said Col. Wm. Ingalls, speaking before the Tacoma branch of the Red Cross Tuesday morning.

The rooms of the Red Cross on the 5th floor of the Tacoma building were full of quiet activity, as the women cut and rolled bandages and made kits for the soldiers. Work did not cease while the colonel spoke.

"The regiment was the biggest ever sent into the service of the United States," he said, "and much of the credit was due to the wives, mothers and sweethearts of the state of Washington. You women can't carry a musket, perhaps, but you can do some things that men can't do."

"In talking so large a body of green men into the field, rigid discipline was of course necessary, in order to keep them in good condition. The temperature went up to 120, and we perspired day and night, which was weakening. With a diet regulated to this temperature, however, and with the constant attention of the regiment's physician, the men were kept in splendid shape."

"I can tell you that Troop B is in fine shape, too. I dined with Capt. Palmer at Calexico, and we hadiced tea. I asked him if that was a regular thing, and he said, 'Sure! Tacoma took care of us!'"

"The men appreciate the work of the Red Cross women highly."
